

# SEINERS LANDED HANDSOME FARES

OVER 200,000 POUNDS OF BLINKS LANDED AT THIS PORT THIS MORNING.

Seiners hit the blinks again yesterday, and this forenoon over 200,000 pounds of the fish had been brought to port. Splitters got the bulk of the fish, although a few of them, mostly large, were bought for shipment to outside markets. The receipts today came on top of a fairly good day yesterday, there having been four trips totalling 69,000 pounds brought down from Boston during the afternoon. The only fresh fish arrival was the off-shore dragger Beauty St. Joseph with 50,000 pounds for the General Seafishers.

# BOSTON STORY IS SHORT ONE TODAY

ONLY 11 ARRIVALS AND RECEIPTS ALL TOLD ARE UNDER 150,000 POUNDS.

### WANTS ACTION AGAINST THE DOGFISH PEST

The codfishery of this country is being robbed of millions of dollars every year by not taking drastic measures to cope with the plague of dogfish that infest the waters all along our coastline, says the St. John's Trade Review.

In the Gulf of St. Lawrence the Quebec fisheries are having the problem of a white porpoise plague to contend with, but the government has decided to take vigorous action in the hope of either exterminating the pest or of driving them from the coast. Fifty boats manned by men armed with guns are instructed to shoot porpoises whenever seen. Airplanes are also employed to drop bombs on porpoise schools. It is hoped in this way that their numbers will be quickly reduced and the Quebec fishing area finally freed from this menace to fishing operations.

The time has arrived for our government to take some definite action in reducing the number of dogfish that infest our shores in increasing numbers each year. By the establishment of a reduction plant and placing a bounty on the dogfish, valuable fishmeal and fertilizer can be manufactured from the carcasses and an equally valuable oil extracted from the livers. The industry could be made a profitable investment but some bounty scheme that will encourage intensive fishing must be formulated.

### N. F. Lobster Market

Shipments of live lobsters from Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick shores of Northumberland Strait have been heavier than last year. The Boston and New York markets have been accepting all the shipping lobsters available along both sides of the strait. The canners have also been taking large quantities of the small lobsters.—St. John's Trade Review.

GROUNDFISH RECEIPTS OVER 1,500,000 POUNDS—PRICES GOOD.

A fleet of 40 craft was on hand at the Boston fish pier this morning. Total receipts were 1,437,000 pounds of groundfish, 116,000 pounds of mackerel, 22,000 pounds of blink mackerel, 180,200 pounds of mixed fish 1000 pounds of shad, and 700 pounds of butterfish.

Prices remained firm. Haddock sold at \$3; large cod, \$4 and markets, \$2.25. Mackerel brought 8¢ cents with blinks at 5 to 5.25 cents.
