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DRAGGER HOME ON MAIDEN TRIP

SCH. RUTH LUCILLE LANDED FIRST FARE THIS MORNING.

The new dragger Ruth Lucille, home from her maiden trip this morning, brought 35,000 pounds of fresh fish for the General Seafoods Corporation. The Boston beam trawler Yale came directly from the grounds for the same company with 75,000 pounds of fish, mostly haddock. From Nova Scotian ports, the Canadian schooner Arawana arrived for C. F. Mattlage and Sons Company with a fare of salt fish. One trip of blink mackerel was also reported. Gill netters brought 20,000 pounds of fish yesterday afternoon.

SIXTEEN IN THE FLEET AT BOSTON

RECEIPTS MOSTLY GROUND FISH —MARKET HOLDS UP VERY GOOD.

Prices held up pretty well in the Boston market this morning. There were 16 vessels at the pier when trading began. Receipts comprised 510,000 pounds of groundfish, 64 swordfish, 4000 pounds of blinks and 100,000 pounds of groundfish. Haddock opened at \$3.50; large cod, \$5 and markets, \$2.50. Blink mackerel brought 9 cents and swordfish, 14 to 22 cents.

Worms Kill Many Fish.

Elk Lake, one of the most popular fishing centres in the state of Oregon, is closed to anglers by combined order of the State Game Commission, the United States Bureau of Hatcheries and the State Board of Health. The lake shores are strewn with dead fish, ranging from two inches to two feet long, as the result of an attack by parasite worms and the sportsmen's paradise has been deemed unsafe to public health. It was early in August that sportsmen became alarmed about the number of sick and dead fish in the lake and the game commission was informed of the condition. Matt Ryckman, State Superintendent of Hatcheries, investigated and, with P. E. Lynes, stationed at the lake by the commission, decided that worms were responsible. Fishermen have been kept out since by warnings, but henceforth they will be kept out by orders.

TWO FARES OF SALT FISH LANDED

FRESH FISH RECEIPTS WERE SMALL AGAIN TODAY.

Two fares of salt fish, one from the Provinces and the other from Maine ports, are being unloaded here today. The Canadian boat O. K. Service from Nova Scotian ports is taking out a fare of 100,000 pounds of salt fish at the Gorton wharf, and the Maine freighter Lizzie J. Clark will begin to unload her trip of 1600 quintals of salt fish at the P. J. O'Brien wharf Monday morning. The offshore dragger Beauty St. Joseph, brought 50,000 pounds of haddock for the General Seafoods this forenoon. The only mackerel landed was a deck load from the boat Elizabeth and James, some 21,000 pounds being taken out at the Cape Ann Cold Storage early this morning, the rest of the trip, amounting to 50,000 pounds, going to Boston. Gill net receipts yesterday amounted to 10,000 pounds.

BAKER'S DOZEN AT BOSTON PIER

RECEIPTS LARGE GROUND FISH THIS MORNING—MARKET REMAINS GOOD.

A fleet of 13 vessels furnished the supply at the Boston fish pier this morning. Ten of them had ground and flatfish. Two had swordfish and the other brought in a fare of blink mackerel. Total receipts were 465,000 pounds of groundfish, 55,000 pounds of blink mackerel, 82 swordfish and 51,000 pounds of mixed fish. The market held about the same.

LAST WEEK'S PIER RECEIPTS AHEAD OF 1928 PERIOD

There were 81 arrivals at the Boston fish pier for the week ending September 5 and receipts amounted to 5,037,500 pounds of fresh fish. In the corresponding week of 1928, there were 96 arrivals and receipts of 4,422,875 pounds of fresh fish.

From January 1 to date, there have been 3901 arrivals and receipts of 181,687,112 pounds of fresh fish as compared with 3845 arrivals and receipts of 153,991,985 pounds in the same time of 1928.

BIG YEAR FOR SWORDFISHERMEN

The swordfish fleet has landed at Boston to date, 26,381 fish as compared with 15,746 fish to the same date in 1928. A number of vessels are still to come from Georges and the Cape Shore.

Trawler Burns.

Burned to the water's edge three miles off Chebucto Head, the trawler Nova No. 1, engaged in the government fish collecting service, sank early Saturday. Capt. Moller and his crew of three escaped.

LOCAL MARKET AGAIN GLUTTED

SEINING FLEET SWAMPED MARKET WITH BLINK MACKEREL YESTERDAY.

The largest day's receipts of mackerel this year, was reported yesterday when 23 of the fleet arrived with over 1,400,000 pounds of blink fish, taken anywhere from two miles east of Thacher's to Sequin, Maine. Late Saturday night the fleet began to arrive and by noon yesterday the harbor resembled one of the busiest week-days of the year. Boats were hurrying back and forth from wharf to wharf to sell their fish, and many of them had to take on extra ice, and lay over until this morning. A few "took a shot" and went to Boston, where the market had practically no mackerel today. Help was scarce, and even the temptation of a dollar an hour failed to bring out any large number of men to care for the fish. In some instances wharf foremen and even the owners themselves had to split the fish they were buying.

Fresh fish receipts were confined to two off-shore draggers with a total catch of 109,000 pounds of haddock, which went to the General Seafoods for filleting. Two fares of bluebacks arrived last night, and were disposed of to the local storage plants. The Canadian schooner Araucania with 300,000 pounds of salt fish from the Provinces, is taking out at the Frank C. Pearce wharf, having arrived late yesterday.
