There was one arrival of fresh fish up to noon today, a shore dragger with 2000 pounds of fresh fish. Every boat, or nearly every boat, engaged in fishing, is out either dragging or seining, and if there are any mackerel schooling where the last rafts of blinks were found by the fleet, tomorrow should see the market pretty well supplied again. Gill netters had a fair day's fishing yesterday.

# LARGE COD SOARS TO \$9 AT BOSTON

**MARKET REMAINS GOOD ON OTHER  
VARIETIES—RECEIPTS ARE  
LARGE.**

A fleet of 16 vessels furnished a liberal supply of ground and flat fish to the dealers on the Boston pier this morning. No mackerel or no swordfish were offered. Eight steamers brought in the bulk of the fish. Fares aggregated 906,000 pounds of groundfish and 96,000 pounds of mixed fish. The market continued strong.

Haddock was unchanged from yesterday at \$3.50, but codfish moved upward quite sharply. Large cod brought \$9 and markets \$4.

Back from the Maine coast with 75,000 pounds of blink mackerel, the local seiner, Mary A., had the market all to herself this morning, and sold her trip to the Booth Fisheries Company for salting. Capt. Wideman reported that the fish were quite plentiful along the Boothbay region, but there were only a few boats there fishing. The only other arrivals today were sch. Oretha F. ### Fishing Poor.

Survey of the local swordfishing industry during the past few months brings forth the information that the catch this year to date has been the smallest in years, says a Sydney, C. B. dispatch. During the past month, owing to the bad weather, few catches have been made and unless finer weather prevails during the coming week the swordfishing industry for the present season will be the poorest for a number of years.

The fishermen of Louisburg, Maina-Dieu and other Cape Breton points at the first of the season ran into a small portion of good luck, and during the first week over 150 swordfish were shipped to the Boston market, but since then the weather has been against them.

Owing to the flooding of the Boston market by the California swordfish this year, the prices paid have been very low, and many of the fishermen gave up the sword fishing and kept to the more stable market such as cod, haddock, etc., for which there is always a good market.

# FISHERMAN LOSES LEG WHEN CAUGHT IN HOISTER AT SEA

Picked up on the Georges Banks, after a radio had brought the Coast Guard destroyer Fanning racing to the scene, Frank Lowe, 31, a member of the crew of the Boston fishing trawler Heron, was landed at Vineyard Haven last night from the Fanning with his right leg so badly mangled that it will be necessary to amputate it.

Lowe was caught in the hoisting cable of the trawler. The craft, like many of the trawlers, is equipped with

radio and a message brought the Fanning, on patrol off the Banks, to the scene. First aid was given the man by the officers of the destroyer and emergency treatment was taken.

Arriving off the harbor, Lowe was transferred from the destroyer to a Coast Guard patrol boat and landed at the United States Marine hospital at Vineyard Haven. Word had been sent ahead by the Fanning and doctors were in readiness for prompt action on his case. While it was necessary to amputate the leg, it was said at the hospital that Lowe would live, in all probability.

# FILE "SHORT" LOBSTER CASE AGAINST MAN WHO WAS TOOL OF OTHERS

Joseph Perry Santos of Western avenue, charged with possession of 18 "short" lobsters was before the district court this morning and fined \$36, but the sentence was later revoked and the case placed on file with the understanding that in the future, he would be no errand boy for those engaged in the lobster business.

Game Warden Carl N. Grant told the court that Santos, who was found with

a bag containing the lobsters, after he had been watched and found taking them from the water at Fresh Water Cove, was merely the tool of others in the business and because of his physical condition the others had taken advantage of him and tried to cover up their operations in violating the lobster laws.

Judge York told Santos that he did not believe his story that he found the bag of lobsters, and warned that if again caught the case would be taken from the files and the fine imposed.

# ENGINEER ON LOCAL SEINER BREAKS ARM

Manuel Souza, engineer on board of the local seiner Mary A., had them is-fortune to break his arm while fishing off of the Maine coast yesterday, and is a patient at the Gregory hospital, Boothbay, Me., where he was taken following the accident.

Souza was tending the hoister as the engine was being emptied of mackerel when he became entangled in the line, and in attempting to clear

it, twisted a couple of turns about the arm, snapping the bone.

A 40-foot speed boat which was off of Boothbay harbor where the Mary A., was fishing at the time, was hailed by Capt. Widerman. One of her occupants proved to be a physician who was on an island call and had his kit with him.

The physician gave Souza the best attention he could in the rolling sea, and then took him to the Gregory hospital at Boothbay for further attention.

# FEW MACKEREL AT BOSTON PIER

### FOUR FARES OF BLINKS AND FEW LARGE FISH LANDED THIS MORNING.

The Boston market did not open quite so strong this morning as yesterday, although prices generally held up pretty well. There were 17 vessels at the pier when trading began and the receipts totalled 644,000 pounds of groundfish; 55,400 pounds of mixed fish, 121,000 pounds of blink mackerel and 5000 pounds of large mackerel.

Haddock opened at \$3 to \$3.50. Large cod were cheaper, \$5 to \$6, and market sold for \$3. Large mackerel were up to 20 cents; blinks, three cents.
