SMALLER FLEET AT FISH PIER

ONLY 14 ARRIVALS AT BOSTON THIS MORNING—HADDOCK UP TO \$5.

Arrivals at the Boston fish pier this morning numbered only 14, including a seiner with a small lot of blinks that were eagerly taken by the trade. Receipts totalled 512,000 pounds of groundfish; 15,000 pounds of blink mackerel and 500 pounds of large mackerel which were taken by the Mildred Silva. Prices were higher.

Yesterday by express were received 108 barrels of mackerel and the Yarmouth steamer had 384 barrels, an unusually large shipment for so late in the season.

SELL HADDOCKER TO SATISFY LIBEL

The auxiliary fishing schooner Fannie F. Hickey was sold at the South Boston Fish Pier yesterday afternoon to satisfy claims. Deputy Marshal Ghiloni conducted the sale and the haddock was knocked down to the Irving Usen Company of Boston for \$6760. Before the new owner can take possession, however, the sale will have to be confirmed by the United States District Court, as the appraised value was \$12,000 and the bid was not two-thirds of this amount, as required by law.

ONLY FIVE AT BOSTON TODAY

ARRIVALS ARE ALL STEAMERS WITH ABOUT 400,000 POUNDS GROUND FISH.

Arrivals at the Boston fish pier this morning were all steamers, five of them, and they brought in 363,500 pounds of groundfish and 72,200 pounds of mixed fish. The market was firm and prices were high. Haddock sold at \$5; large cod, \$4.75 and markets \$4.

Light Change.

About December 11 the Ambrose Channel light vessel, at the entrance to New York Harbor, will be moved about a mile 151 degrees and reestablished in latitude 40 degrees 27 minutes 6 seconds north longitude, 73 degrees 49 minutes 22 seconds west.

Rules of Road

According to the Hydrographic Bulletin, the international rules of the road provide a signal consisting of two prolonged blasts of the fog signal every two minutes when a vessel is under way but stopped in fog. This signal is useful, but should not be confused with the two blasts of the starboard-to-starboard passing signal, which should not be sounded when vessels do not see each other, but is sometimes so used nevertheless.

POOR YEAR ON THE LABRADOR

Capt. Sam Cox, master of the schooner Silver Thread, on his arrival at Halifax reported the poorest fishing season at the Canadian Labrador since he commenced trading there 14 years ago. The Silver Thread carried only 1,000 quintals of dry fish in her holds, as compared with her capacity for 2,600 quintals. Usually, the vessel makes three trips yearly to Labrador, but Capt. Cox stated he would not return there on the third trip, as there was no fish to secure.

The trading schooner H. H. MacIntosh, Capt. D. Edgar McCarthy, of Shelburne, reported at Mutton Bay, is also having difficulty in securing fish, and it was stated is about ready to return. Both vessels, which sailed out of Halifax, returned in ballast on the first trip. As a result of the scarcity of fish it was stated that the season will be an unprofitable one for the owners of the vessels.—Halifax Herald.
