FAIR AMOUNT OF FISH TODAY

ONLY ONE SMALL TRIP MACKEREL LANDED THIS MORNING.

A fair amount of fresh fish was landed here this morning, while a small seiner landed a light trip of mackerel at the Producers' Fish company, the Boston boat Mayflower bringing in 3500 pounds. Boat Inca which has been gill netting off of the Maine coast, returned this morning, bringing 10,000 pounds of cod for Murray & Tarr. The off-shore dragger Beauty St. Joseph landed a 65,000 pound fare to fillet at the General Seafoods corporation. Three of the small Provincetown trawlers landed 1500 pound fares at Murray & Tarr's. Gill net receipts yesterday fell down to around 20,000 pounds.

BOSTON FLEET IS SMALL

ONLY 10 ARRIVALS, FOUR SEINERS, AT PIER.

Receipts at the Boston morning comprised 176,000 pounds of groundfish, 89,000 pounds of mackerel and 28,500 pounds of fish. There were only the arriving fleet. Price Haddock opened at \$4.50; large cod, \$3.50; and mackerel were quoted at \$3.65 to 4.15.

FIRST SWO BROUGHT

The three swordfish landed by sch. Liberty at New Bedford on May 31 sold for 70 cents per pound. The same boat landed a few fish at the same port last year on June 4. Quite a number of the swordfish fleet have sailed and indications are that the fleet will be the largest ever. First arrivals at the Boston pier last year were on June 10, the Isabelle with 41 and the Irene and Mabel, 67 fish. They sold for 40 cents per pound for large and 30 cents for small.

Lobsters Plenty.

Lobsters are in good supply from Nova Scotia, but the hot weather of the past few days was not favorable for the transportation of those fish. Prices have been steady with no change in the market.

WEEK OPENS VERY QUIETLY

LOCAL FRESH FISH SUPPLY NOT VERY GOOD FOR STARTER.

Local fresh fish receipts over the week-end were only fair, gill netters landing enough to start the shipments out of town. From off shore dragging the schooner Leonora C. brought 65,000 pounds of fresh fish for the General Seafoods this forenoon. The only other arrival was a small trawler at Powers & McDonald. Gill net receipts yesterday and Saturday amounted to 22,000 pounds, only two boats lifting yesterday.

BIG FLEET AT BOSTON PIER

THIRTY-FOUR ON HAND THIS MORNING WITH OVER A MILLION POUNDS.

Receipts at the Boston fish pier this morning were fairly heavy and comprised 667,000 pounds of groundfish, 309,000 pounds of fresh mackerel and 172,000 pounds of mixed fish. There were 34 arrivals, including 11 seiners. The market was strong and groundfish prices up. Haddock started at \$4 to \$4.50; large cod, \$7 and markets, \$3. Mackerel were quoted at 3.65 to 4.15 cents per pound.

FISHERIES IN APRIL SHOWED BIG EXPANSION

(Special to the Times).

Washington, D. C., June 9.—The landings by fishing vessels at the principal New England ports increased to 34,022,632 pounds valued at \$953,356 during April as compared with only 26,556,696 pounds valued at \$744,461 landed at the same ports during April of a year ago, according to a report just made public by Commissioner Henry O'Malley of the bureau of fisheries.

Fresh haddock comprised the largest catch during the month, amounting to 24,033,056 pounds valued at \$613,526, as against the 19,858,338 pounds worth \$462,733 landed during the same month of 1929, the report indicates. Fresh cod also showed a substantial increase, from 4,339,115 pounds valued at \$160,240 during April, 1929, to 5,900,176 pounds valued at \$182,425 during the same month this year.

Other species comprising the catch during April, 1930, were: salted cod, 69,015 pounds valued at \$3420; fresh hake, 721,640 pounds at \$21,079; fresh pollock, 470,114 pounds at \$11,942; fresh cusk, 362,768 pounds at \$8956; fresh halibut, 318,111 pounds at \$55,

863; fresh flounders, 1,583,559 pounds at \$44,357; and other fresh fish, including butterfish, rosefish, sea robins, sharks, whiting, wolfish, lobster, scallops, livers and spawn, 514,193 pounds valued at \$11,768.

For the first time a netter landed the first catch of mackerel in the south, O'Malley states. Good catches of groundfish were landed from Georges and Brown's bank. Hand-line codfish vessels reported moderate catches.

Gloucester Landings.

Landings by fishing vessels at Gloucester, one of the three principal New England ports, totaled 3,535,909 pounds valued at \$103,592 during April, a decrease from the same period of last year, when 5,027,112 pounds valued at \$113,426 were landed, according to the commissioner's figures.

The Gloucester catch during April of this year is reported as follows: fresh cod, 1,377,475 pounds valued at \$46,745; salted cod, 69,015 pounds at \$3420; fresh haddock, 1,931,030 pounds at \$48,562; fresh hake, 10,855 pounds at \$306; fresh pollock, 65,035 pounds at \$1934; fresh cusk, 2480 pounds at \$40; fresh halibut, 559 pounds at \$102; fresh flounders, 74,990 pounds at \$2417; and other fresh fish 4470 pounds valued at \$66.

PIER LANDINGS 131 MILLION POUNDS

Receipts of fish at the Boston pier for the week ending June 5, were 4,502,700 pounds of fresh fish. There were 116 arrivals. In the corresponding week of 1929, there were 116 arrivals and receipts of 5,283,400 pounds.

From January 1 to date, there have been 2933 arrivals and receipts of 131,150,475 pounds of fresh fish as compared with 2555 arrivals in the same period of 1929 and receipts of 115,281,912 pounds.
