

LIGHT RECEIPTS HERE TODAY

ONE DRAGGER, HANDLINER AND TWO SEINERS MAKE UP LIST.

Arrivals of fresh fish here this forenoon were light, for up to noontime the only craft to reach port were two Italian seiners, a handliner, and an offshore dragger. One halibuter came down from Boston with a fare of salt fish. The offshore dragger Bettina landed 55,000 pounds of fresh fish at the General Seafoods, and the mackerel were taken by the Producers Fish Company. The handliner Teazer weighed out around 30,000 pounds at the Gorton-Pew plant, while the halibuter Adventure took out her salt fish at the Frank F. Smith Company's wharf. Four gill netters landed 7000 pounds of fresh fish yesterday afternoon.

ANOTHER BIG DAY AT BOSTON

FLEET OF 46 VESSELS ON HAND WITH ALL KINDS OF FRESH FISH.

About every variety of fresh fish was represented in the catches of 46 vessels on hand at the Boston fish pier this morning when the opening bell started the day's trading. The fleet comprised 18 mackerel seiners, one halibuter, seven sworders and the rest had groundfish.

Total receipts were 850,000 pounds of groundfish, 500,000 pounds of fresh mackerel, 372 swordfish, 12,000 pounds of halibut, 135,000 pounds of mixed fish and 16,000 pounds of salt cod. Prices were a little lower.

Some 225 barrels of mackerel arrived by rail. Lobsters, too, formed an important item in the day's trade, 136 crates arriving by rail and a cargo of 12,000 pounds arriving from Garabouse Bay, N. S., on board the boat Chester T. Marshall.

RECEIPTS ARE SOMEWHAT BETTER

SEVEN ARRIVALS WITH FRESH FISH WEIGHED OUT THIS MORNING.

Local receipts of fresh fish were much better today than yesterday, there being seven arrivals since last night. Four were off-shore draggers, one a shore dragger, one netter and a halibuter down from Boston to re-fit. The draggers Edith and Elinor, Ruth and Margaret and Beauty St. Joseph, with a combined fare of 125,000 pounds of haddock, took out at the General Seafoods plant for filleting, while the dragger Corinthian went to the Gorton-Pew plant to fillet. The halibuter Natalie Hammond with a fare of salt and fresh fish, discharged her trip at the Davis Brothers Fisheries company wharf. The Progressive Fish company had one small dragger and a mackerel netter.

TWENTY-EIGHT AT BOSTON PIER

RECEIPTS CONTINUE HEAVY,
PARTICULARLY ON GROUND-
FISH—MARKET FAIR.

A fleet of 28 vessels was on hand at the Boston fish pier this morning with 960,000 pounds of groundfish, 205,000 pounds of fresh mackerel, 101 swordfish, 5000 pounds of halibut, and 100,000 pounds of mixed fish. There were nine seiners and two swordfish. The market held up pretty good. Haddock started at \$3; large cod, \$3 and markets, \$2. Mackerel opened at 3 to 3 1-2 cents and swordfish, 25 and 15 cents.

ACTIVITY ALONG THE WATER FRONT

Signs of increasing prosperity continue in evidence along the waterfront. During the past few years considerable repairing about the wharves has been done, and a number of firms have made extensive improvements and alterations. In addition to other notable changes about their property the Gloucester Cold Storage and Warehouse Company are now extending their business to the adjoining wharf. The gasoline tank and small building have been removed and carpenters and pile drivers are at work preparing for the erection of a large fish shed, which will occupy a greater part of the wharf.

The wharf work is being done by Hall Brothers, who at the completion of the present job, will start on a new pier for the Frank E. Davis Company, adjoining on the west, their present Rogers street property.

Gallons of Scallops

What is believed to be the largest haul of sea scallops ever landed in New England arrived at New Bedford yesterday, when the schooner Friendship, after a week of dredging the scallop grounds off Nantucket brought in 1800 gallons. Captain Cleveland Burns and his crew received only \$2 a gallon, but report that the trip was profitable, even at the low price the catch brought. Most of the sea scallops were shipped to the Middle West. Scallop men here said that the record haul, prior to this one, was 1500 gallons.
