

# TRAWLER AMHERST HAS NICE FARE

REPORTED THIS MORNING WITH 145,000 POUND TRIP OF HADDOCK.

The trawler Amherst of the General Seafoods Corporation, came in to port during the night from the grounds with one of the finest fares she has landed since going into service. The craft hailed for 145,000 pounds of fish, the bulk of which was haddock. This fare, with a trip landed by the Geraldine and Phyllis at the same plant, will go to fillet. One small fare of fresh mackerel totaling 1000 pounds, and two seiners with small hauls of blue backs are the only other arrivals reported here today.

# SUES LOCAL CONCERN FOR INFRINGEMENT.

(Special to the Times.)

**Boston, August 13.**—The General Seafoods Corporation of Gloucester has been named defendant in a bill in equity filed against it in the U. S. district court here by Paul W. Peterson of Glen View, Illinois, who charges infringement on his patent of a new and useful improvement on method and apparatus for handling comestibles.

The plaintiff states that on July 11, 1922, he was granted a patent giving him the right for 17 years to make, use and vend his invention throughout the United States and its territories and that he has invested large sums of money for said inven-

tion of which he was the original and sole inventor.

The plaintiff in the prayer of the bill of complaint asks that the corporation, its agents, employees and officers, etc., be temporarily during the pendency of the suit and afterwards permanently and perpetually enjoined and restrained from manufacturing or selling or offering for sale the invention.

The plaintiff asks that the corporation be compelled to account for and pay over to him all gains and profits which it made or shall have received from said infringement and that the court in rendering a decree assess or caused to be assessed in regard to the gains and profits to be accounted for the damages which he has sustained by reason of said infringement, and that court may increase the actual damages to three times the amount.

### RECEIPTS ALL GROUND FISH—ONE SWORDER ON HAND BUT NO MACKEREL.

Arrivals at the Boston Fish Pier this morning numbered 21 and the receipts were practically all groundfish with the exception of one swordfish trip. Fares aggregated 736,000 pounds of groundfish, 112,000 pounds of mixed fish and 36 swordfish. The market continued firm with prices holding up. The Yarmouth steamer yesterday brought 65 boxes of iced swordfish and 45 crates of live lobsters.

## SHORE FISHERMEN PROTEST RULING

Because the local fish dealers decided that the smallest ground fish which would be accepted under the market classification would be 23 inches instead of 20 and that no more iced fish would be accepted from the fishermen, 150 indignant shore fishermen held a meeting of their union at North Sydney, C. B., recently and decided that unless the fish dealers agreed to their terms there would be no more fish landed at the North Sydney wharves after last Saturday.

The demands of the union, which come as a counter proposition to that which the dealers are attempting to enforce, are that the same prices and classifications as those in vogue in Canso be used here and that the fishermen be charged a fair price for frozen bait.

At present the Canso fishermen are getting one and three-quarter cents for large cod, one cent and one-half for market and haddock and one cent straight for shack or scrod. The North Sydney fishermen have been getting only one and one-half cents for their steak fish, one and one-quarter cents for market and one-half cent for scrod and all haddock has been classified as scrod. In addition to this they have been paying from three to three and one-half cents a pound for frozen herring for bait and now the size of fish which will be accepted as market fish has been raised. In addition to this the dealers want the fishermen to land their catches daily instead of icing their fish and making two-days trips as has been their custom in the past.

There are about 20 boats, each carrying crews of from five to 10 men, involved in the present difficulty and three fish dealers. Shortly after the North Sydney fishermen's union was organized last fall these fishermen adopted a policy of boycotting a certain fish dealer which resulted in the best prices ever paid for fall cod and haddock being given the fishermen.

The decision of the fishermen to demand a reduction in the price of frozen bait also brings to a head a problem which has long been a troublesome one to the fishing industry of this port.

### Change in Light.

The Lighthouse Bureau has changed the frequency of the Boston Lighthouse and Cape Cod Lighthouse radio beacons, so that each will hereafter operate on 284 kilocycles, and send in clear weather during the third 15 minutes of each hour. These two signals will also be so synchronized that one will send during the silent interval of the other. The change is expected to increase the efficiency of this already wonderful aid to navigation.
