PLENTY OF FRESH FISH IN PORT THIS MORNING — MACKEREL RECEIPTS LIGHT.

Local dealers were pretty well supplied with fresh fish this morning, there being no less than a half dozen druggers with haddock to fillet and three halibuters to refit. Mackerel receipts, however, were light, two vessels bringing between them, 5000 pounds.

At the General Seafoods this forenoon, five druggers with a total catch of 275,000 pounds were waiting to unload. Sch. Elizabeth and Ruth had a 30,000 pound fare at the Gorton Pew filleting plant, the same concern also getting some salt and fresh fish from the halibuter Grand Marshal. The halibuters Natalie Hammond and Adventure each took out a small amount of fish at Davis Brothers and Frank E. Smith's.

TWO HALIBUTERS AT BOSTON PIER

POLLYANNA AND PILGRIM HAVE 15,000 LBS. EACH—GOOD RECEIPTS OF OTHER FISH.

There were 27 vessels in the fleet at the Boston fish pier this morning. Receipts totalled 615,000 pounds of groundfish, 31,000 pounds of halibut, 86,000 pounds of fresh mackerel, 109 swordfish, 60,000 pounds of mixed fish, 20,000 pounds of saltfish. The market held up very good.

Oysters Are Abundant.

(Special to the Times).

Washington, D. C., August 21.—The unusually early and abundant set of oysters which has occurred along the coast of Connecticut this season exceeds all records for the past 15 years, the bureau of fisheries declares. The record crop is attributed to the abnormally high air and water temperatures, abundant rainfall, and the very apparent improvement in the quality of the water as a result of a decrease in trade-waste pollution.

In Milford Harbor the setting of conferences have been held with a large number of the oyster-growing concerns and advance information and predictions given out regarding the time and intensity of setting. The oystermen have taken advantage of the favorable circumstances and have made the earliest and greatest planting of shells and gravel in recent years, and in addition have put out large numbers of partition collectors.

The work on starfish control carried out at Cold Spring Harbor, Long Island, has been speeded up in view of the fact that heavy sets of oysters in Connecticut waters are frequently accompanied by a heavy crop of young starfish, which soon devour them.

NEW CRAFT OUT TO ADJUST COMPASS

The new sch. Magellan, launched recently at Essex, was taken out in the harbor for compass adjustment this morning, by her skipper, Capt. Joseph Rose, who later gave her a short trial trip outside.

SMALLER FLEET AT BOSTON TODAY

GROUND FISH RECEIPTS HOLD UP—FEW SWORDFISH IN BUT NO MACKEREL.

Boston arrivals numbered 17 this morning, three swordfish and the remainder groundfishermen. No seiners were on hand, the fleet having been unable to fish on account of the boisterous weather outside. Total receipts were 720,000 pounds of groundfish, 142 swordfish, 1000 pounds of halibut and 98,000 pounds of mixed fish. The market was fair. Haddock sold at \$3; large cod, \$3.50; and markets, \$2. Swordfish brought 15 and 22 cents.

HARBOR A FOREST OF LOFTY PINE, AS FLEET SEEKS PORT OF SHELTER.

For the first day in a long spell, not a pound of fish of any kind was landed in port. The morning found the harbor dry of fresh fish, but every wharf was crowded with fishing craft of all descriptions. Swordfishermen down to refit, draggers waiting a chance to run out, halibuters and seiners tied up for better weather, and small shore boats likewise sheltered from the easterly, all blended into a picture, a marine panorama depicting a forest of lofty pine spars standing jagged and black against the sky-line. With the dropping of the glass this morning, preparations were made for a start tomorrow and by Monday the harbor will be bare again.

CONSIDER COSTS OF PROPOSED NEW FISH PIER

State House, Boston, August 23. The actual preliminary work on estimating costs, etc., of the building of a fish pier by the state in the city of Gloucester was started at a meeting of the Gloucester Fish Pier commission at the State House, yesterday.

Senator Cornelius F. Haley of Rowley presided. The other legislative members of the commission are Representative Archibald H. Estabrook of Haverhill, Representative Harold E. Webber of Gloucester and Repre-

sentative John A. Jones of Peabody. Commissioner of Public Works Frank E. Lyman was also present with District Waterways Engineer Francis L. Sellev.

All the possible sites for a fish pier were carefully considered and it was finally voted have state engineers proceed at once with the work of preparing estimates as to probable costs for each of the sites suggested.

It was announced that upon the obtaining of these preliminary figures the commission will confer with Mayor John E. Parker and members of the city government at which time the work of the commission up to date will be gone over.
