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# FLEET DRYING CANVASS MADE PRETTY SIGHT

## Some 150 Craft Held Up by Easterly Furnished Unusual Spectacle for Throng of Spectators Yesterday

One of the prettiest sights the harbor has contributed to art for many years was visible yesterday, when nearly 150 craft crowded from the Gloucester Cold Storage plant on Rogers street to the Fort company on Commercial street which drew the attention of hundreds of spectators during the morning and early afternoon hours.

The heavy rain Saturday drenched the small riding sails of the many craft in port for shelter and with the coming of yesterday morning's sun, it was drying out time for the fleet. Sails of all colors from new white to discolored canvas were hoisted, and as many fishermen remarked, never in years has there been such a large number of vessels in port with sails

drying, in fact not since the days before engines came to replace the sail as its chief power, has there been such a wonderful marine view.

### Artists Out in Force.

Taking advantage of this exceptional fact, artists from all over the Cape crowded every wharf where a view of the fleet could be had, and for several hours devoted themselves to transferring on the canvas, the scene before them.

At noon time, the break came, and one by one the vessels slipped off their lines, started their motors and headed toward the bay in search of mackerel and today, like most any other day along the waterfront, at this time of the year only a few brown spars point skyward, decks glisten with rain, and the sails are gone.
