### N. S., Dried Fish Market.

Says the Halifax Maritime Merchant: Iceland and Norway are making business most difficult for our dried fish exporters in certain markets; the low prices they are quoting at present are almost unbelievable. Fishing in Norway is ended for the present season, but the Iceland fishery, as our readers know, continues throughout the whole year. Iceland's total catch for the present year promises to be a large one. Since 1926, Iceland's output has increased 300,000 quintals. The outlook for an improvement in prices in the near future is far from encouraging. And yet, strange to say, with all the increase in the world's catch in the last few years and the dull markets of last year, there was not a large carry-over of old fish to the present season. So far as we can learn there are no heavy stocks of these in any market and it rather goes to prove that even with a reduced purchasing capacity in many countries by reason of the low price of sugar, coffee and other commodities the consumption of dried fish has not only been maintained but in certain countries has been increased. This fact, last year they paid for a large f.o.b. Lunenburg, but it is a fair assumption that no such figures will be paid this year. The Lunenburg fleet now on the banks did not do very well at the beginning of its present trip, but we noticed last week that squid had struck in on the Newfoundland coast, so we are hoping we shall have better news in a few days now. We hear that the catch on the Gaspe coast is better this year than last year, but, of course, prices are lower, so it is not possible yet to say what the return to the fishermen will be.

RECEIPTS PRACTICALLY ALL  
GROUNDFISH ARE LIGHT  
TWO SEINERS IN.

A fleet of 15 vessels furnished the supply for dealers on the Boston fish pier this morning. Receipts were almost all groundfish with the exception of two small seining fares and aggregated 425,000 pounds of groundfish, 11,000 pounds of fresh mackerel and 77,000 pounds of mixed fish. Prices continued high.

### N. S. Lobsters.

Next week a two months' lobster fishing season opens for what is known as District No. 8. In those portions of the Northumberland Straits there is much activity in preparation of the fishermen's gear. Despite gloomy reports regarding market conditions, there is that hope eternal in the human breast which causes both canners and fishermen to set to work trusting that the situation will improve as time goes on. Even after experiencing a spring season that was unsatisfactory, some packers from other districts have been talking of opening up new plants on the New Brunswick and P. E. I. shores. The fishermen are hoping that their newly formed unions will be strong enough to strengthen the markets.

Their main hope, however, is the expected improvement in the demand for live lobsters for Canadian and American centres. Boston reports normal sales, but good catches along the Maine coast sufficient for present requirements. Much depends then upon the continuance of fine weather for canning purposes, the quantities of equivalent of prevailing values and without prospects of much improvement. In Europe canned lobsters have declined fully \$50 per case since the season opened this year. If the consumer obtains this advantage the sale of the article should increase. It may be sufficient to absorb the surpluses carried over from last year and the extra quantities canned in the spring season, but that effect cannot be felt within the next two months.—Maritime Merchant.

# SEINERS FIND MACKEREL AGAIN

NINETEEN OF THEM AT THE  
FISH PIER THIS MORNING  
WITH 204,000 POUNDS.

A fleet of 30 craft, 19 of them seiners, brought fares to the Boston fish pier this morning. Total receipts were 222,000 pounds of groundfish, 17 swordfish, 204,000 pounds of fresh mackerel, and 60,000 pounds of mixed fish. Groundfish prices remained high. Mackerel were cheaper and sold at 5 1-2 to 5.75 cents per pound.

# FLEET FINDING SWORDFISH SCARCE

Total receipts of swordfish have been 17,391 fish as compared with 25,389 fish last year. Owing to the scarcity of swordfish on the banks quite a number of the recent arrivals have discontinued that branch of fishing.

### FISH PIER RECEIPTS.

#### Landings To Date Over 13 Millions More Than Last Year.

Receipts at the Boston fish pier for the week ending August 21 were 6,163,200 pounds of fresh fish, landed by 106 vessels. In the corresponding week of 1929, there were 112 arrivals and receipts of 6,576,850. From January 1 to date, there have been 4095 arrivals and receipts of 184,559,525 pounds of fresh fish. In the same period of 1929, 3693 vessels brought in 171,155,862 pounds.

### LOBSTER SEASON OPENS IN NEW BRUNSWICK

The lobster season has opened in New Brunswick and receipts are now coming forward from there. Sales are reported from first hands to wholesale dealers at 20 cents per pound in comparison with 35 cents per pound in the corresponding week last year.

# DRAGGER TAKES MAMMOTH SHARK

A mammoth shark weighing close to 500 pounds and measuring 11 feet 10 inches, was trapped in the flounder drag of the sloop Paul Revere fishing off of Boone Island yesterday, and brought to port this morning where it was landed at the wharf of Capt. John Chianciola. The shark, of no value as food, was given to Charles McPhee for lobster bait and as it lay on the former Wallen wharf, quite a crowd gathered to see it.

### SEEK TRAWLER IN NEED OF ASSISTANCE

Coast Guard patrols are looking for the Boston beam trawler Breaker, owned by the Bay State Fishing Company, which sent in a radio on Tuesday that she had boiler trouble and was in need of assistance. The dense fog that prevailed offshore yesterday interfered with the search, but the patrol boats expect to find her. The fact that no second message came from the crippled fisherman is taken to indicate that her wireless apparatus is out of order. Besides the Coast Guard boats, the other steamers of the Bay State Fishing Company in the South Channel have been instructed by radio to watch for the Breaker.
