

# LARGE FARE OF CANADIAN FISH

BRITISH CRAFT BROUGHT 500,000-POUND TRIP FROM MAGDALENES.

One of the largest fares of salt fish to arrive from the Provinces for some time was brought in last night by the Nova Scotian schooner Mary Sabina, which reported at the Gorton wharf with 500,000 pounds. The fish were picked up in the Magdalene Islands by buyers and freighted here for skinning. Fresh fish receipts this morning were good, three draggers landing haddock trips at the General Seafoods plant for filleting. Two seiners each with 1000 pounds, and one gill netter with a similar amount, were the only other arrivals.

# BOSTON SUPPLY IS AMPLE TODAY

TWENTY-ONE ARRIVALS HAVE GROUND-FISH, MACKEREL AND MIXED-MARKET LOWER.

A fleet of 21 craft was on hand at the Boston fish pier when the bell rang for the opening of trading this morning. Seven seiners were among them. Total receipts were 570,000 pounds of groundfish, 91,000 pounds of fresh mackerel and 90,000 pounds of mixed fish.

The market was lower again. A shipment of 374 crates of lobsters was received by rail.

# LEAKING CRAFT AT LIVERPOOL

Sch. Morning Star, Capt. Abbott, arrived in port last evening, leaking very badly. The crew had been pumping steadily since Monday night when the schooner developed a serious leak on LaHave bank. Her depth prevented her being taken on the railway here. Arrangements are in progress with the insurance company in regard to demands being made by the crew for their services pumping and bringing the schooner into port. The 25,000 fish, in poor condition, will probably have to be thrown overboard.

# LOCAL MARKET WELL SUPPLIED

SEINERS LANDED PLENTY OF MACKEREL SINCE SATURDAY.

Local seiners fairly awamped the local market with mackerel this morning and yesterday, no less than 20 trips being reported. Most of the fish were sent to storage and shipped, but some of them found their way to the splitters. With Boston full again, it is expected that others will come during the afternoon. One off-shore dragger was the only fare of fresh fish outside of mackerel reported.

# FIND TOOTHBRUSH IN COD'S TUMMY

A large codfish taken in the trawl of the steamer Wild Goose, which arrived at the Fish Pier yesterday, was found to have swallowed a toothbrush. It bore the name of William Whalen, Long Harbor, Placentia Bay, N. F. Whalen was one of the crew of the Beam Trawler Seiner of the Portland Trawling Company's fleet, which foundered on Georges Bank, February 9, 1929, with loss of all hands. The codfish was caught in about the locality where the Seiner was believed to have gone down.

The printing on the brush is still legible, after more than 16 months' immersion.
