

# LARGE FARE OF CANADIAN FISH

BRITISH CRAFT BROUGHT 500,000-POUND TRIP FROM MAGDALENES.

One of the largest fares of salt fish to arrive from the Provinces for some time was brought in last night by the Nova Scotian schooner Mary Sabina, which reported at the Gorton wharf with 500,000 pounds. The fish were picked up in the Magdalene Islands by buyers and freighted here for skinning. Fresh fish receipts this morning were good, three draggers landing haddock trips at the General Seafoods plant for filleting. Two seiners each with 1000 pounds, and one gill netter with a similar amount, were the only other arrivals.

# BOSTON SUPPLY IS AMPLE TODAY

TWENTY-ONE ARRIVALS HAVE GROUND-FISH, MACKEREL AND MIXED-MARKET LOWER.

A fleet of 21 craft was on hand at the Boston fish pier when the bell rang for the opening of trading this morning. Seven seiners were among them. Total receipts were 570,000 pounds of groundfish, 91,000 pounds of fresh mackerel and 90,000 pounds of mixed fish.

The market was lower again. A shipment of 374 crates of lobsters was received by rail.

SEINERS LANDED PLENTY OF MACKEREL SINCE SATURDAY.

Local seiners fairly awamped the local market with mackerel this morning and yesterday, no less than 20 trips being reported. Most of the fish were sent to storage and shipped, but some of them found their way to the splitters. With Boston full again, it is expected that others will come during the afternoon. One off-shore dragger was the only fare of fresh fish outside of mackerel reported.

# FIND TOOTHBRUSH IN COD'S TUMMY

A large codfish taken in the trawl of the steamer Wild Goose, which arrived at the Fish Pier yesterday, was found to have swallowed a toothbrush. It bore the name of William Whalen, Long Harbor, Placentia Bay, N. F. Whalen was one of the crew of the Beam Trawler Seiner of the Portland Trawling Company's fleet, which foundered on Georges Bank, February 9, 1929, with loss of all hands. The codfish was caught in about the locality where the Seiner was believed to have gone down.

# BIG SUPPLY AT BOSTON FISH PIER

FLEET HAS ALL KINDS OF FISH —MARKET OPENED FAIRLY GOOD.

Heavy receipts of fresh fish were brought to the Boston fish pier this morning by a fleet of 39 vessels. Fares aggregated 1,170,000 pounds of groundfish, 266 swordfish, 243,000 pounds of fresh mackerel, 210,000 pounds of mixed fish and 2500 pounds of shad.

Groundfish prices were fairly good at the opening. Mackerel sold for 9 cents for large and 3 1-2 cents per pound for tinkers. Swordfish started at 18 and 22 cents.

# SALT FISH IN COLD STORAGE

SCH. MILDRED ROBINSON BROUGHT 200,000-POUND TRIP TO PORT.

Sch. Mildred Robinson returned yesterday from Newfoundland ports with a cargo of 200,000 pounds of kenched cod, and this morning hauled into the Gloucester Cold Storage plant to store her trip. This is done to prevent discoloring of the fish which are partially green when received here.

Fresh fish receipts today were reported with the arrival of the beam trawler Cornell with 100,000 pounds of haddock for the General Seafoods Corporation and the Laura Goulart, down from Boston with a small fare of fresh fish for the Gorton-Pew Fisheries Company. Mackerel receipts fell off considerably from yesterday, there being but two small fares. Three gill netters lifted yesterday with a total catch of 12,500 pounds.

# BOSTON RECEIPTS LESS LAST WEEK THAN YEAR AGO

At the Boston fish pier for week ending August 29, there were 101 vessels with fares totalling 3,816,400 pounds of fresh fish. In the corresponding week of 1929, there were 127 arrivals and receipts of 5,493,750 pounds. From January 1 to date, there have been 4196 arrivals receipts of 188,375,925 pounds of fresh fish as compared with 3820 arrivals and receipts of 176,649,612 pounds in the same period of 1929. Dragger report fish scarce on Georges and all the fishing grounds. A number of good catches were brought in recently from La Have banks and brought good prices.
