FRESH AND SALT FISH RECEIPTS

FREIGHTER FROM MAINE PORTS FOR GORTON-PEW FISHERIES COMPANY.

There was a fair amount of fish at this port this forenoon, receipts including a beam trawler, a cargo of salt fish, some fresh fish from Boston and one small fare of mackerel. From points along the Maine coast, the freighter William Keene arrived yesterday afternoon with 150,000 pounds salt fish for the Gorton-Pew Fisheries Company. The dragger Amherst arrived from the grounds during the night with 120,000 pounds of haddock for the General Seafoods Corporation and the halibuter Grand Marshal, down from Boston to refit, brought a fare of salt and fresh fish for Gorton-Pew Company. The seiner, Roma I., with 1800 pounds, of mackerel took out at Powers & McDonald's.

DRAGGER HAD MIXED RECEIPTS

SWORDFISH AND MACKEREL INCLUDED IN FARE OF ELIZABETH AND RUTH.

The dragger Elizabeth and Ruth, arriving home from fishing during the night, brought a varied assortment of fresh fish. Besides her fare of 45,000 pounds of cod and haddock, the dragger scooped up 500 pounds of fresh mackerel, and then to make the trip complete, managed to wrap a swordfish in her bag and dump it on deck.

Other arrivals since yesterday were the schooner Laura Goulart, and two small shore trawlers. Gill netters had a fair day of it yesterday. Most of the seining fleet came into port during the afternoon minus any fish, conditions outside being anything but ideal for seining the past couple of days.

BOSTON FLEET SMALLER TODAY

START GROOMING OF THE THEBAUD

Local Racer Hauls Out of Fishing— Engine To Be Taken Out and Craft Given General Slicking Up

Work of preparing sch. Gertrude L. Thebaud, American entry in the coming international fishing schooner racing with sch. Bluenose of Lunenburg, N. S., began in earnest this morning. The vessel came into port yesterday, and after discharging the balance of her fare of 85,000 pounds of fresh fish, went to her headquarters the Atlantic Supply Company's wharf on Rogers street, and will remain there until ready for her trials, previous to the races of October 9, 11 and 13.

Considerable work is necessary to prepare the Thebaud for racing. Her engine will be taken out, miscellaneous deck fittings removed, and tuned up generally. It will probably require 10 days to two weeks, and then there will be many tryouts to get the proper balance and trim before she meets the Bluenose.

In the meanwhile things are humming at race headquarters at the Master Mariners' rooms in arranging the many details. The committee on decorations, Joseph E. Mellow, Jr., chairman, met last night and discussed their plans for making the racing days colorful, and in keeping with the big event.

FIVE SEINERS WITH MACKEREL

RECEIPTS OF 116,000 POUNDS— GROUNDFISH ARE MORE PLENTIFUL TODAY.

Twenty-two vessels brought fares of fresh fish to the Boston pier this morning. Five seiners had mackerel and two others had swordfish. Total receipts were 845,000 pounds of groundfish; 116,000 pounds of fresh mackerel, 23 swordfish, 14,000 pounds of bullseye mackerel and 95,000 pounds of mixed fish. Prices remained about the same as yesterday.
