BOSTON PRICES LITTLE HIGHER

THIRTEEN VESSELS ARRIVED THIS MORNING WITH ABOUT 450,000 POUNDS.

The market at the Boston fish pier was a little stronger again this morning and prices on about all varieties moved up. There were 13 arrivals and receipts were 428,000 pounds of groundfish and 15,300 pounds of mixed fish. Haddock opened at \$5.50 to \$7; large cod, \$4 to \$5 and market cod, \$3.

Another large lot of Canadian frozen smelts arrived by rail from New Mills, N. B. The shipment comprised 2063 boxes.

DOZEN VESSELS AT BOSTON TODAY

RECEIPTS OF 450,000 POUNDS--PRICES ABOUT SAME AS YESTERDAY.

Today's supply of groundfish at the Boston fish pier was furnished by 12 trawlers and draggers arriving from the various grounds. They brought 363,000 pounds of groundfish and 82,000 pounds of mixed fish.

Arriving craft report encountering unusually severe weather. This was particularly true of those fishing to the eastward.

The market opened fairly strong but with prices a little lower than yesterday. Haddock sold at \$5.50 to \$6; large cod, \$4 to \$5 and markets, \$3 to \$4.

COLD STORAGE FISH HOLDINGS 13 PER CENT MORE THAN YEAR AGO

(Special to the Times.)

Washington, D. C., January 22.—Cold storage holdings of frozen fish on December 15, 1930, totaled 85,317,475 pounds, compared with 75,806,989 pounds on the same date of the previous year, an increase of 13 per cent over that year, and showing also an increase of 25 per cent over the five-year average, according to a statement by the commerce department's bureau of fisheries just made public.

shad and shad roe; 20 per cent in whiting; 10 per cent in smelts; 10 per cent in sea herring; 4 per cent in halibut, and 10 per cent in bluefish.

Decreases on December 15 of the holdings of the more important species as compared with normal holdings were reported by the bureau of fisheries as 83 per cent in pike, including pickerel, jacks and yellow jack; 70 per cent in cisco (tullibees); 39 per cent in butterfish; 15 per cent in lake trout; 9 per cent in mackerel; 7 per cent in whitefish, and 3 per cent in sturgeon and spoonbill cat.

Stocks of cured herring in cold storage on December 15, 1930 amounted to 15,464,661 pounds, compared with 19,557,194 pounds for the same date of the previous year, or a decrease of 21 per cent. Stocks of mild cured salmon increased 6 per cent in that period.

SLIGHT FIRE ON THE SHAMROCK

The Boston fishing schooner Shamrock, of the O'Hara fleet, had a slight fire on board yesterday morning as she lay moored at the Boston Fish Pier. The blaze was in the engine room and resulted when a spark from an acetylene torch being used by workmen on board ignited the woodwork in the compartment. Land apparatus and the fireboat responded to alarms sent in, but the ship's crew had the fire under control before the firemen arrived. The damage was trifling.

NO ARRIVALS AGAIN TODAY

HALF DOZEN SMALL BOATS LANDED FARES LAST NIGHT.

No arrivals were reported here today and all the fish on hand arrived late last night and yesterday afternoon, landed by a half dozen small draggers and trawlers, and eight gill netters. Shore receipts amounted to only 8000 pounds and the eight gill netters landed 13,000 pounds.

QUICK WORK ON

FITTING BROOKLINE

Her maiden trip cut short by loosening of rudder bolts, the new trawler Brookline, owned by the Boston Trawling Company, and managed by Ed Dunn, was towed to Boston late last night, and this morning began the discharge of her trip.

The Brookline, a sister ship of the the Newton, was launched at Essex in December, and left Boston on her maiden trip on January 18, only 25 days having been required to fit her with her engine, rigging and other interior necessities. She is equipped with a 500 horsepower Fairbanks Morse engine.

SEIZE DRAGGER WITH CARGO OF LIQUORS

After successfully eluding the Coast Guard and reaching the inner harbor, the Automatic, Boston-owned auxiliary fishing boat of Vito Manicipo, 21 Moon street, according to Government records, was seized by United States customs men inside of Lost Bridge, at the foot of K street, South Boston, yesterday, with \$50,000 worth of liquor on board.

The boat was tied up, with fishing nets spread over the deck and hanging over the side, and was abandoned when the four members of the customs special duty squad arrived alongside in the speedboat Peg.

The condition of the boat indicated that she had just come in from sea, as she was covered with ice. Evidently she made contact with a rum-loaded vessel during the night,

took on her load of about 584 cases and returned.

Proceedings have been instituted by Deputy Collector Thomas F. Finnegan under the Liquor Smuggling act.

The Automatic registers 29 tons gross, and was built at Winthrop in 1918. She is licensed as a fishing boat. The liquor was transferred from the boat to the Appraisers' Stores yesterday afternoon, and the boat will be forfeited and sold.

The captured boat is one of the fleet of small flounder draggers and on Wednesday landed a small fare of fresh fish at this port. She is well known here, having made many visits to port with fares of fresh fish.
