# SEINER LANDS FIRST MACKEREL TRIP OUT SOUTH

Seiners found fish last night off of the Jersey coast! That's the word the boys along the waterfront have been waiting to hear since the first of the fleet sailed last week for Cape May. And it was a most welcome announcement for owners of the boats numbering 50 or more at Cape May, who have been on tip-toe waiting for the first strike.

Last night seven of the local fleet went out in search of fish. The only arrival heard from was the St. Rita, Capt. Frank Favoloro, which brought into Wildwood, N. J., 30 barrels of seven-inch fish caught about 80 miles south of Cape May breakwater.

ONLY NINE VESSELS WERE REPORTED AT THE PIER THIS MORNING.

Today's receipts of fresh fish at Boston showed a slight decrease from the amount landed yesterday, for only nine vessels were tied up when business opened for the day. Capt. Bob Wharton brought in the Fabia with 100,000 pounds of groundfish, 90,000 pounds being haddock. ### Portland Fishing News.

Her boilers leaking badly, the Bay State Fisheries trawler Ripple limped into Portland yesterday afternoon, went to Burnham and Morrill's East Dering plant to await a chance to discharge her 200,000 pounds of fish and then was ordered back to Portland for repairs.

Her officers reported a bad day at sea Tuesday. Through the northeast storm the vessel drifted, her boilers in such bad shape that she was unable to make steerage way. Every lumber broke over the heavily-laden vessel, but the Ripple came through the blow without any damage.

The Ripple was the second trawler arrival in Portland Harbor Wednesday. The Boston College, owned by the Frank J. O'Hara Company, reached the harbor early in the morning, but did not take out her 10,000 pound cargo until last night.

Burnham and Morrill's wharf was occupied yesterday morning by the trawler Foam, which reached port Tuesday night with approximately 10,000 pounds, and in the afternoon the Amherst, which took out 200,000 pounds, finishing about 9 p. m. The Foam sailed for the banks last night and the Amherst sailed today.

Another Bay State trawler, the B. is expected in port today with 10,000 pounds or more.

Four gill netters landed 38,000 pounds of groundfish at Portland wharves yesterday. The new netter ward III., Capt. Arthur Ricker, of Pofisco had 10,000 pounds and Elizabeth B. and Anna C. took 5,000 pounds apiece.

# HALF DOZEN BOATS LANDED

AMOUNT OF FISH RECEIVED THIS MORNING FROM DRAGGERS WAS SMALL.

A half dozen small draggers and trawlers took out small fares of fresh fish at local wharves this morning, but only one of them had any kind of a trip. The total receipts of the six boats only amounted to a little less than 9000 pounds. Gill netters numbering 19 hauled gear yesterday and landed a combined catch of 48,500 pounds.


