TODAY.

Mackerel netters found poor fishing last night, some of the boats hauling back empty nets and others securing only enough for the cook to serve for breakfast. The largest fares, and the only ones worth reporting, were one of 1500 pounds and another of 450 pounds. Fresh fish receipts since yesterday have been very light, only a half dozen gill netters lifting, bringing in about 32,000 pounds. One small shore trawler with 1000 pounds was the only other arrival today.

LIGHT RECEIPTS AT BOSTON PIER

ONLY EIGHT ARRIVALS TODAY—
PRICES UP AGAIN, WITH
HADDOCK AT \$10.

Eight vessels comprised the fleet at the Boston fish pier this morning. Catches were small and the total receipts were 161,000 pounds of groundfish, 2500 pounds of butterfish, 5500 pounds of sole and 47,900 pounds of mixed fish. The market again stiffened and prices made another advance.

Haddock sold at \$9 to \$10; large cod, \$10 and markets \$6. Overland and rail receipts included a carload of sardines from Wiscasset, Me., and 100 boxes of pollock in addition to an assortment of smelts, lobsters and other varieties.

BRINGS TIDINGS

OF MARINE DISASTER.

Capt. Roderick E. Gillis of the steamer Black Point, from Newport News, now discharging a cargo of coal at Weymouth, brought tidings of a sea disaster. On December 8, in latitude 38 degrees, 41 minutes north, longitude 74 degrees, 35 minutes west, about abreast of the Delaware Capes, the Black Point passed close to an overturned vessel, about 110 feet long, which might have been a fishing dragger. The derelict was floating just awash, directly in the path of vessels on the course from Winter Quarter Lightship to Five Fathom Bank, and is a very dangerous obstruction to navigation. Capt. Gillis sent a radio to the Hydrographic Office giving the position of the wreck.

N. F. Herring Fishery.

To date this season's herring fishery in Bay of Islands does not exceed 2500 barrels, according to reports that have reached us, being only 25 per cent. what it was this time last year.

Last week there was some fishing on Friday, and boats got from six to 20 tubs, while one boat secured 33 tubs. The fish were scarce on Saturday. On Monday of this week there was an improvement, but yesterday eleven boats secured only 60 tubs. The fishing was principally about North Arm Point.—Western Star, Bay of Islands, Dec. 3.

MACKEREL FLEET IS HAULING OUT

NETTERS FISHING LAST NIGHT,
CAME BACK TODAY WITH
POOR HAULS.

Mackerel draggers have about finished their fall work, for the fish are running scarce and hauls last night netted not over 400 pounds. Some of the fleet made good hauls Wednesday night, but iced their fish and took out a two days' catch this morning. Fresh fish receipts were fair today, seven of the small draggers returning with a combined catch of 15,000 pounds. Gill net receipts yesterday amounted to 33,000 pounds.

HADDOCK \$6 TO \$7 ALTHOUGH RECEIPTS TOTAL ONLY 350,000 LBS.

A fleet of 17 vessels landed their fares at the Boston fish pier this morning. Receipts were small and aggregated only 280,000 pounds of groundfish and 75,000 pounds of mixed fish. The demand was not quite as brisk and the market was off from yesterday's peak.

Haddock opened at \$6 to \$7; large cod, \$6 to \$8 and markets, \$4 to \$6.

THIRTY-ONE AT BOSTON TODAY

MARKET FIRM—RECEIPTS TOTAL 875,000 POUNDS OF FRESH FISH.

When the Boston fish pier resumed activities this morning, there was a fleet of 31 vessels in the dock. Fares were not large. Total receipts were 675,000 pounds of groundfish and 200,000 pounds of mixed fish. Haddock sold at \$6.50 to \$7, large cod, \$10 and markets, \$5 to \$6.
