LITTLE DRIFTS 6000

MILES IN THREE YEARS

A bottle cast overboard from the Boston steamer Glen White, on one of her voyages between Boston and Norfolk, on November 11, 1927, by Louis di Palma of Everett, then chief officer, was picked up on Eleuthera Island, in the Bahamas group. November 30, 1930, according to a report filed with the hydrographic office in Washington. In the three years and 19 days interval, it is estimated that the bottle drifted approximately 6000 miles. Its story will be used in the extensive study being made of ocean currents by the hydrographic office.

**RECEIPTS OF 772,000 POUNDS--
MARKET FAIR WITH HAD-
DOCK AT \$4.**

A fleet of 17 craft was at the Boston fish pier this morning. Receipts amounted to 556,000 pounds of groundfish, and 116,000 pounds of mixed fish. Eight of them were steamers and small fares were the rule. Demand was not very brisk after the holiday. Haddock sold at \$4; large cod, \$3 to \$3.50, and markets, \$2 to \$2.50.

SMALL RECEIPTS AND HIGHER PRICES FOR HALF DAY SESSION.

A fleet of eight craft, five of them steamers, was at the Boston fish pier this morning for the short session. Receipts were 200,000 pounds of groundfish and 64,000 pounds of mixed fish. The market was firm and prices higher. Haddock was up to \$5; large cod, \$5 to \$6; market cod, \$3.

A shipment of 19 boxes of salmon and halibut arrived from the west coast yesterday.

Many of the vessels which remained in port over the holiday got away yesterday for the fishing grounds and expect to be back in port for the Monday morning market.
