FAIR RECEIPTS OVER WEEK-END

CARGO OF SALT FISH ALSO ARRIVED FROM MAINE PORTS.

Local dealers received a fair supply of fresh fish over the week-end, and up until noon time today, 18 boats had landed fares at the wharves of local firms. The boats brought a total catch of a little better than 57,000 pounds of mixed fish.

Saturday nine gill netters arrived with 12,000 pounds of fresh fish and yesterday 10 gill netters with a combined catch of 12,600 pounds. Hail and Murray took the fares from six small trawlers, the Producers' Fish Company, the trips of three druggers, Murray & Tarr, five trawlers and druggers and William B. McDonald took the fares of two small trawlers John Chianciola had one dragger beside his three gill netters. Other arrivals included the Edith L. Boudrea and Babe Sears, both from Boston to refit for fishing.

OVER A MILLION POUNDS AT HUB

THIRTY-FOUR ARRIVALS TODAY
—HADDOCK OPENS AT
\$3 to \$4

A large supply was available for dealers on the Boston fish pier when the bell rang for the resumption of trading this morning. Thirty-four craft, including nine steamers, were in the dock with 975,000 pounds of groundfish, and 282,000 pounds of mixed fish. The steamers, judging from the amount of codfish, have been fishing to the eastward and brought back sizable fares.

The market was not strong at the opening. Haddock sold for \$3 to \$4, but codfish was cheap at \$2 for large, and \$2 to \$2.25 for markets.

NINE BOATS LANDED FISH

TOTAL RECEIPTS SINCE YESTERDAY AMOUNTED TO 22,000 POUNDS.

Nine druggers and trawlers brought 22,000 pounds of mixed fish since yesterday to port, these boats being the only arrivals reported during the past 24 hours. 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SEVENTEEN ON HAND AT PIER

RECEIPTS OVER 700,000 POUNDS THIS MORNING—HADDOCK AT \$3.

Receipts were heavy again this morning at the Boston fish pier when 17 vessels brought in 610,000 pounds of groundfish and 118,000 pounds of mixed fish. The market was a little lower. Haddock sold at \$3 to \$3.50; large cod, \$1.75 and markets, \$2.

Four carloads of frozen Canadian smelts, about 3000 boxes in all, were received yesterday. A car of oysters from Baltimore and a shipment of 156 boxes of frozen halibut and salmon from Oregon also arrived. Much of the fish received during the day was not handled because there was much more than could be absorbed.

Struck Whistler

The auxiliary fishing schooner Waltham II of Boston struck the whistling buoy off Chatham yesterday, and was boarded by the Coast Guard crew from the Nauset station, who found that the vessel was leaking badly. The captain said he required no assistance and would try and make port at Boston. The vessel headed north, with her pumps working to keep her free of water.

Dragger Disabled

The fishing dragger Cambridge, formerly the Marieta B., while making a trial run, broke down off Boston lightship yesterday and was picked up by the Coast Guard patrol boat 171 and towed to President Roads, where she was turned over to the tug Sadie Ross, which towed her to the Atlantic Works, East Boston, for repairs. Several invited guests were on board the dragger at the time.

N. S. Fish Notes

The present open weather is proving a boon to fishermen of Shelburne, who are able to operate daily. In former years there was little or nothing doing at this season, especially as regards small boat operations. Daily the boats are going out and bringing in fairly good catches and vessels are also doing much better than in previous years although the price is not by any means satisfactory. Lobstering continues in many sections and the price is now 20 and 22 cents. In some sections the lobstermen have hauled out for a few weeks and will prepare for another catch in March.

The season as it stands now with a nine inch size measure and running straight from December to the end of May, is probably the most satisfactory that the fishermen have yet had.

Protection from "outsiders" is being sought by 75 lobstermen from the south shore of Prince Edward Island who gathered in the Confederation Chamber here.

They declare that during the last two years New Brunswick fishermen had been exploiting lobster areas off the south shore of the island which local fishermen by mutual consent had given a measure of protection, and in which a profitable industry had been built.

A resolution has been passed asking the federal department of fisheries "to adopt some regulation which will prevent such numbers of outside lobster fishermen from coming into any district as to detrimentally affect the operations and welfare of local lobster fishermen."

The trawler Lemberg, Captain Samuelson, of the National Fish Company, arrived at Halifax on Saturday from the banks to discharge about 70,000 pounds of fish. The Lemberg will not return to the banks but will up for a period.

Portland Arrivals.

Coast Guard Aids.

A Coast Guard patrol boat set out for Nantucket in a heavy fog Sunday night with three women who sought to reach the bedside of another woman, seriously sick on the island.

Through the courtesy of Commander Roderick S. Patch at Woods Hole, the women, Mrs. H. A. Murphy, Mrs. Frank Pholar and Mrs. Joseph Maynard, were taken aboard the CG-147 early last night. In good weather the trip would take four hours.

Shortly before midnight the boat Denehy, in at the Fish Pier at Boston yesterday from LaHave, was compelled to put into Lunenburg for engine repairs and later was forced to make Liverpool, N. S., because of a leak. The captain complained because he was unable to purchase provisions or oil at the Nova Scotia ports, and as a result he was obliged to cut short his stay on the fishing grounds.

TWO FARES FOR SPLITTERS

FIRST LANDINGS FOR THE KNIFE IN SEVERAL WEEKS.

Gorton-Pew took two small fares of fresh fish for splitting yesterday afternoon and this morning, when the haddockers Laura Goulart and Mary F. Curtis came down from Boston. These are the first fares of fish to be brought to the splitters in several weeks. Aside from these two, local receipts were light, being confined to several small draggers and trawlers with fares ranging from 200 pounds up to 2000 pounds.

Ten of the gill netters hauled their gear yesterday and brought in a total catch of 13,200 pounds. The only other arrivals reported were from Boston to re-fit for fishing.

LOTS OF CODFISH ARE IN—THE FARES AND PRICES SAG

A fleet of 15 vessels brought fares to the Boston fish pier this morning. Total receipts were 311,000 pounds of groundfish, and 104,200 pounds of mixed fish. Codfish exceeded haddock receipts today, and prices for that variety scaled downward. Large cod sold for \$1.50 to \$2; and markets, \$2 to \$2.25. Haddock sold for \$4.

By rail came a lot of 230 boxes of halibut from Prince Rupert, British Columbia, and three big consignments of frozen Canadian smelts from New Brunswick. The latter totaled 6698 boxes.
