TWO SMALL FARES RECEIVED TODAY

**BOSTON DRAGGERS LANDED
SMALL TRIPS OF FISH
AT FORT.**

Two Boston draggers which arrived late yesterday afternoon, took out small fares of fresh fish at the Producers Fish Company this morning, being the only fish received here for three days.

The dragger Olivia Brown, scheduled to sail yesterday, remained in port, and this morning, the fish which she brought here Monday, were sold to the Cape Ann Cold Storage Company.

None of the gill net fleet were out yesterday, neither were the small trawlers or draggers, but most of the latter fleet hope to clear port before nightfall.

TRAWLER HITS BARE MARKET--- CREW PROFIT

In the face of one of the biggest days of the season, when the market was heavily stocked with groundfish, the beam trawler Coot of the Portland Trawling Company, at Boston, Monday from Georges, made an admirable showing yesterday when she closed books for the trip. Capt. John M. Boland, weighed out a total of 201,685 pounds of fish, one of the largest single hauls landed recently, netting exactly \$4895.30. The Coot had been out 11 days.

HIGHER PRICES AT BOSTON PIER

**RECEIPTS TOTAL ABOUT 300,000
POUNDS—HADDOCK UP
TO \$3.50.**

Ten vessels docked at the Boston fish pier this morning and brought in 235,000 pounds of groundfish, 60,000 pounds of mixed fish and 2000 pounds of sole. The market was considerably stronger. Haddock was up to \$3.50, large cod, \$4 to \$5.25, market cod, \$4.

By rail yesterday came 1300 packages of mackerel from Provincetown and a carload of frozen Canadian smelts.

SIX STEAMERS TO GO SEALING

So far arrangements have been made to send six steamers to prosecute the sealing industry this season.

Bowring Brothers fleet consists of four ships, as follows: Imogene, Capt. A. Blackwood, Terra Nova, Capt. A. Kean, Eagle, Capt. Wes Kean, Ranger, Capt. R. Badcock, Job Brothers will not send any ships, but they have so far chartered two of their steamers to St. John's parties. The steamers Ungava, Capt. Peter Carter, and Beothic, Capt. Jacob Kean, have been chartered. The parties interested are Crosbie Co. and Marine Agencies.

These six ships will take crews numbering in all nearly one thousand men. It is expected the date for sailing will be the 6th of March, and for killing March 13.

HADDOCK AT \$5 THIS MORNING

**LENTEN DEMAND AND LIGHT
SUPPLY CAUSES BOOST IN
BOSTON MARKET.**

The second day of the Lenten season found only a small fleet at the Boston fish pier and a light supply of fresh fish. The seasonal demand and small receipts caused a stiffening of the market with a sharp increase in prices on all varieties. Receipts this morning totalled 201,000 pounds of groundfish and 60,000 pounds of mixed fish. Haddock brought \$5; large cod, \$4 and markets, \$3 to \$4.

The Yarmouth steamer brought 72 crates of live lobsters, the smallest lot in several weeks. A big supply of frozen smelts arrived from Canada, 3933 boxes and 29,700 pounds in bulk.

RUSH SEAMAN OF CUTTER TO THE HOSPITAL

Stricken with an attack of appendicitis, Jose Roque, a seaman on the U. S. C. cutter Mojave, was taken to the Addison Gilbert hospital this morning shortly before 11 o'clock, and was operated on shortly after noon.

The Mojave has been in harbor since Monday, and early this morning Roque was seized with pain which grew worse as time went on. Deeming medical attention necessary, Roque was taken to Base 7, from where he was conveyed in the police ambulance to the hospital for an operation.

Golden Haddock

A golden haddock, first of the species seen this year, was brought in at the Boston Fish Pier yesterday by the beam trawler, Ebb, which caught it on Georges. An ordinary four-pound specimen, the haddock has a coloring of light bronze from head to tail. It was turned over to the government fishery experts for study.

FIRST ARRIVALS SINCE SATURDAY

**GILL NETTERS LANDED 7500
POUNDS HERE YESTER-
DAY AFTERNOON.**

The first landings of fresh fish since Saturday were brought to port by gill netters yesterday afternoon when a half dozen of the gill netting fleet brought a total catch of 7500 pounds. The highest fare was one of 2000 pounds, brought by the Phyllis A. The others, with one exception, had only 1000 pounds each.

Two small trawlers, one with 2000 pounds and the other with 3000 pounds, weighed out their catches at William B. MacDonald's, which constituted the only receipts received here today. The bulk of the small dragging and trawling fleet still remains in port, waiting for a break in the weather.

**HEAVY NORTHEAST STORM AT
SEA, HOLDS FLEET IN
PORT.**

There were no arrivals of fish during the past 24 hours and local dealers find themselves today with bare beds and a waiting market.

Due to the heavy off-shore winds, none of the local fleet of draggers or will netters were out yesterday, and none are out today, the entire fleet remaining in port waiting for a break in the weather. There were three arrivals from Boston yesterday afternoon, two haddockers, and a dragger, all three down to refit for fishing.

Dealers are hopeful that the weather will moderate sufficiently to enable the fleet to sail either late this evening or tomorrow morning, so that the opening of the week would find a fair supply of fish on hand.

TEN ARRIVALS AT HUB TODAY

**ONE HALIBUTER IN THE FLEET
HAS 35,000 POUNDS—MAR-
KET STILL STRONG**

Sch. Oretha F. Spinney arrived this morning at Boston with a fare of 35,000 pounds of fresh halibut, the third fare to be brought in this season. There were nine other arrivals with 340,000 pounds of groundfish, 22,000 pounds of mixed fish and 1000 pounds of halibut.

Stormy weather, the Lenten season and light receipts were factors in maintaining a strong market. Prices held at yesterday's levels, \$4.50 to \$5 for haddock; \$4.50 for large cod, and \$5 to \$5.25 for market cod.

ASSIGNED FOR ICE PATROL

Coast Guard headquarters has assigned the cutters Champlain and Mendota to the annual International ice patrol and they will leave sometime after March 15. Last year the Tampa and Ponchartrain performed this service.

Owing to the unusually early movement of icebergs into the North Atlantic steamship lanes, the cutter General Greene left East Boston late yesterday to make a preliminary study of the situation. She will check movements of ice southward, also the velocity and direction of currents.

The cutter Mojave anchored in the outer harbor, will be held in readiness in Tiverton basin to extinguish the blaze and prevent it spreading to other craft and nearby property. Authorities believe that the fire might have been set accidentally by gasoline thieves.

Portland Arrivals.

The bad weather of the past few days has played havoc with Portland dealers' receipts, the first fish landed in several days having been brought to port yesterday. The Gloucester draggers, St. Peter and Uncle Sam, driven to port for shelter, took out their fares at the Maine port. The St. Peter had 2000 pounds of mixed fish and the Uncle Sam 1500 pounds of mixed fish. They will remain in Portland until the weather moderates and will then sail for the grounds.
