

## LARK BROUGHT FARE FROM HUB

### TWO TRIPS OF SHAD GO TO COLD STORAGE PLANT.

The most important arrival since yesterday was the haddock Lark, which brought 84,000 pounds of haddock, cod and other fresh fish for filleting at the Gorton-Pew Cold Storage yesterday. Two shad trips arrived, totaling 155 barrels, being taken by the Gorton-Pew and Cape Ann Cold Storage Companies. Two traps had 20 barrels of whiting, both of which took out at the latter company.

Only one netter made port, taking its small mackerel trip to Murray & Hall's. The local seiners association released 10 more craft yesterday to take the places of ten which have made evidently their quota. The best seining trip was that of the Catherine C., which had 11,000 pounds, discharging them at McDonald Fish Corporation.

## HADDOCK UP TO \$3.50 AT BOSTON

### THIRTY-SIX ARRIVALS, BUT NO CHANGE IN MACKEREL AND SWORDFISH PRICE

At the Boston fish pier this morning there were 36 arrivals, including a quartette of swordfish and 16 seiners. Total receipts were 355,000 pounds of groundfish, 300 swordfish, 191,000 pounds of fresh mackerel, and 101,000 pounds of mixed fish. Prices on mackerel and swordfish were unchanged. The market on groundfish braced a little and haddock was up to \$3 to \$3.50 today.

#### Portland News.

With 100,000 pounds of groundfish for Burnham & Morrill, the Diesel trawler Holy Cross of the O'Hara fleet arrived at Portland from the northern edge of Georges Tuesday morning and docked at the consignee's plant at East Deering. After taking out the fare, the trawler sailed for Boston.

Other groundfish fares were taken out Tuesday from the Verna G., 12,000 pounds; the Georgie Bowden, 8,000 pounds; the Annie T. Mack, 6,000 pounds; the Onward and the U & I, 4,000 pounds each; and the Pofisco and the Mary C., 3,000 pounds each. The Falcon landed 18,000 pounds of mackerel.

## N. S. FISH NEWS

### Shag Harbor Fishing.

Fishing is at a standstill as men are at work on the roads, which at present is much more remunerative than cod fishing. One boat was out recently and only secured about 150 pounds of fish owing to the large schools of dog fish that have invaded the coast. Some herring could be taken if there was a good market.

### Shelburne Notes.

Saturday last Shelburne Fisheries Ltd., bought 600 bushels of herring and on Monday 400 bushels.

Tuesday morning the boats brought in 500 bushels and yesterday 300.

Sch. Archie McKenzie landed 5000 halibut at Lockeport and 5000 salt fish on Tuesday.

Sch. Marion and Emily has brought into Lockeport 12,000 halibut and 15 swordfish and 20,000 codfish.

At Lockeport on Tuesday 800 bushels of herring were purchased by the Lockeport Company, Limited. Three hundred bushels were purchased yesterday.

On Monday, Shelburne Fisheries received 1500 pounds of mackerel from the Munroe and Harding trap at East Jordan.

Manus Goodick on Monday had 100 bushels and Harold Goodick 60 bushels.

Swim Bros. are now about full with herring and of late have been buying only about 100 bushels a morning.

Shore fishing is rather dull at present.

Canso, July 25. A number of fishermen and fish handlers met at the Wilmot hotel and formed a new organization to be independent of the Canso Local of the United Maritime Fishermen.

### Large Catches of Tuna Fish.

Large numbers of tuna fish have been taken in the past few weeks at North West Cove, N. S. One trap operated by Miller and Verge has taken 115 to date which have been packed and iced and sent to Boston and New York markets. Another successful fisherman was Lionel Boutilier of Mill Cove. With dart and line he captured 49 tunas to date.

### Notice To Mariners.

The superintendent of lighthouses Portland, Me., announces the following:

Frenchman Bay, Me., Bald Porcupine Lighted Bell Buoy 3B established July 29, 1933, in 168 feet, 5,350 yards 323 degrees from Egg Rock Lighthouse; buoy is black and shows a flashing green light every three seconds, flash 0.3 second, eclipse 2.7 seconds, of 20 candlepower, 12 feet above water. Buoy is to be maintained until about October 1, 1933. (Light List, Atlantic Coast, 1933, No. 18.5 and Local Light List, New England Coast, 1933, No. 18.5 p. 10.)

Sasnoa River, Me., Bareneck Ledge Buoy, 5, changed from second class tall can to first class special can July 27, 1933. (Local Light List, New England Coast, 1933, p. 120.)

Casco Bay, Me., Portland Lightship temporarily replaced by Relief lightship August 1, 1933.

Relief lightship is red with relief in white on each side, Sounds siren fog signal in place of Tyfon, without other change in characteristics. (Light Lists, Atlantic and New England Coasts, 1933, No. 81, p. 20.)
