MACKEREL FILL PROVINCETOWN HARBOR

Great schools of half-pound mackerel, believed to have been chased by larger fish outside, swarmed into Provincetown harbor yesterday and hundreds of people packed the wharves to catch the visitors. It was considered unusual for the fish to go so close to the shore.

Tern Schooner Has Fast Trip.

Making the round trip from St. John to Barbados and Turk's and return to Westport, N. S., in the fast time of 45 days the Annapolis Royal tern schooner Ronald C. Longmire, in command of Capt. R. McD. Barkhouse, is discharging a cargo of salt. The schooner took a lumber shipment from St. John to Barbados and then proceeded to Turk's Island for the salt.

Lemberg Returns.

Trawler Lemberg returned from the banks Saturday with a good fare of fish for the National Fish Company and sailed again for the banks. The trawler Rayon d'Or has again been put into service and sailed for the banks with Capt. Hansen in command.

LARGE SUPPLY FRESH MACKEREL

FOURTEEN SEINERS AT BOSTON TODAY—NO CHANGE IN THE MARKET.

In spite of the fog and bad weather, mackerel catchers continue to find the fish and catch them in quantities permitted by the agreement which the fleet is operating under. Fourteen of the 20 arrivals at the Boston fish pier this morning were seiners.

Total receipts were 181,000 pounds of groundfish, 292,500 pounds of mackerel, 68 swordfish and 93,000 pounds of mixed fish. Groundfish prices were slightly higher. Mackerel were unchanged and swordfish sold for 10 to 16 1-2 cents per pound.

The Yarmouth steamer yesterday brought 21 swordfish for the Boston market.

Of the four Portsmouth swordfishing schooners now in port, only one will return to the banks for another trip, the Aberrance, Capt. Everett Dexter. The other three, the Barbara, the Bernie and Bessie and the Richard J. Nunan, are fitting out at Portland piers for line trawling.

Officials at the Portland Fish Company's plant Wednesday reported receipt of word from Capt. Eddie Armstrong of the sch. Fannie Belle that he had left North Sydney, N. S., with only 17 fish in her pens. The Fannie Belle put into the Nova Scotia port when Reuben Smith, a member of the crew became ill and fished out of the port until he recovered in the hospital and was shipped for the rest of the trip in search of the swordfish, now reported to be scarce.

Swordfish Notes.

Thursday was another ideal day for swordfishing and good catches were reported at Louisburg some of the boats having exceptionally good returns for the day's work. The S.S. Isle Malame left there early in the week with a large consignment of this delectable seafood for Boston. The Nova II, is there now and when loaded will also proceed to the same port.

ONLY NINE IN BOSTON FLEET

ONE SEINER HAS 24,500 POUNDS MACKEREL—OTHER RECEIPTS ARE SMALL.

Receipts of all varieties of fresh fish were small at the Boston fish pier this morning. There were only nine arrivals. One was a mackerel seiner and two brought swordfish. Fares aggregated 211,000 pounds of groundfish, 24,500 pounds of mackerel, 61 swordfish and 84,000 pounds of mixed fish. Prices held about the same as yesterday.

Quite a few swordfish were received yesterday from Nova Scotia. The gasoline boat Dominion Halsyd, from Cape Breton, brought a shipment of 266, the Yarmouth boat had 47 and the St. John boat, 39.

TWO MEN BELIEVED MISSING IN YAWL

A Boston attorney and a young Bryantville man were missing last night in a 40-foot yawl, in which they started from Boston to New Rochelle, N. Y., on Tuesday. They are Bernard Lynn, 31, of Newton, and Charles E. Tinker, 22, son of Charles H. Tinker of Bryantville.

The craft, which was equipped with an auxiliary motor, was due at New Rochelle yesterday. It had been reported safely through the Cape Cod canal Tuesday night.

The two were going to South America in the boat, after they had picked up Henry Bovie of New Rochelle, a friend. Bovie last night said he was confident that his friends tied up at some harbor near the Cape Cod canal, when storm warnings were broadcast. There was plenty of food on the boat, which is named the Roamer.

Steal Lobster

During the fire which razed 12 buildings, near Sunnyside, N. S., Friday night and caused damage estimated in the vicinity of \$25,000, quite a large quantity of cases of canned lobsters were carried off the premises by parties whose names are now said to be in the possession of the R. C. M. P. and action will likely follow. D. Preston MacNutt, who lost his store and 10 buildings, thinks it probable that the fire was caused by a smouldering cigarette butt thoughtlessly thrown down by some one passing through the building where the fire started. The loss is only partly covered by insurance and included a registered Holstein, bull and cow with new born calf, two other calves, two registered hogs, all his hens, chickens and ducks and several wild geese.
