

COASTER ARRIVED WITH SALT HAKE

KATIE SEAVEY UNLOADS 160,000 AT LOCAL WHARVES — GILL NETTERS HAD LARGE TRIPS.

Over 265,000 pounds of salt and fresh fish has been landed here since yesterday. A coaster from Maine ports had 160,000 pounds of salt hake, half for Davis Brothers and the rest for Gorton-Pew Fisheries; a mackerel seiner landed 48,000 mackerel at Davis Brothers; three small seiners had 13,500 small mackerel of which the Cape Ann Cold Storage took two trips of 12,000 total, while the Producers Fish company took a 1500 trip; three traps had 9000 whiting taken by the Cape Ann Cold Storage which also had two of the gill netters with 14,000 pollock.

Five gill netters had 35,000 pollock, the other three trips being taken by Murray & Tarr which had two with 9000 and the Gorton-Pew Fresh Fish department, one, 12,000 pounds.

ONLY THIRTEEN AT BOSTON PIER

RECEIPTS SMALLEST OF WEEK — MARKET STRONG AND PRICES HIGHER.

The market at the Boston fish pier opened strong and with higher prices for the half day session today. Only 13 vessels were on the arriving list, one with groundfish, a swordfish, four with mackerel and the rest with mixed fish. Total receipts were 80,500 pounds of groundfish, 102,600 pounds of fresh mackerel, 27 swordfish, and 70,500 pounds of mixed fish.

On the Yarmouth steamer yesterday were 61 swordfish. A shipment of 68,600 pounds of halibut and 60,400 pounds of salmon is expected at the Hub on Monday.

FOUR TRIPS "REDS" OVER BIG WEEK-END

DRAGGERS LANDED 223,000 RED-FISH HERE—Seiners Had 159,000 MACKEREL.

Gloucester wharves had one of their biggest week-ends of the season since Saturday when a total of 590,000 pounds of fresh fish was landed here, including 223,000 redfish, 159,000 mackerel, 110,500 pollock, 90,800 whiting, and 6000 grey sole. The Cape Ann Cold Storage had two of the redfish fares totalling 150,000 pounds for filleting, while Gorton-Pew Cold Storage had the other two with 73,000 redfish, for filleting; together with two draggers with 40,000 dressed whiting. The Cape Ann Cold Storage also had a dragger with 20,000 dressed whiting, and four traps with 30,750 whiting. Davis Brothers had two seiners with 70,000 mackerel; Pew wharf of Gorton-Pew Fisheries, three seiners, 37,000 mackerel; Slade-Gorton wharf of Gorton-Pew, two seiners, 45,000 mackerel; Producers Fish company, a seiner with 7000 mackerel, and a dragger with 6000 sole.

The gill net fleet had a lot of pollock with seven boats getting 110,500 pounds over the week-end in two lifts. Gorton-Pew fresh fish department had two with 47,000; Cape Ann Cold Storage, three with 34,500; Murray & Tarr, two with 29,000.

DENEHY IN WITH REDFISH FARE

LANDED 135,000 AT SLADE-GORTON'S—THREE SEINERS HAVE TINKER MACKEREL

The Boston dragger Frances C. Denehy with 135,000 pounds of redfish direct from the fishing ground, docked at Slade-Gorton wharf of Gorton-Pew Fisheries this morning to keep the filleters busy, while total arrivals amounted to 244,500 pounds of redfish, "tinker" mackerel, whiting, and pollock. Three seiners had 47,000 tinkers at the Pew branch of Gorton-Pew Fisheries. Two traps had 22,500 whiting at Cape Ann Cold Storage company. Seven gill netters had 40,000 pollock which went as follows: Cape Ann Cold Storage, three netters, 20,000; Murray & Tarr, two, 12,000; and Gorton-Pew Fresh Fish department, two, 8000.

NORMAL SUPPLY AT FISH PIER

TOTAL IS OVER A MILLION POUNDS—THREE SWORDFISHERS ARRIVE.

Twenty-seven arrivals were listed at the Boston fish pier this morning when the opening bell rang for trading to commence. Their fares aggregated 540,000 pounds of groundfish, 242 swordfish, 42,000 pounds of fresh mackerel and 290,000 pounds of mixed fish. The market was a little lower than yesterday. Three boats brought in the swordfish, M. Olivia Brown and the Charlotte. The Brown hailed for 121 fish, record fare of the season.

RECEIPTS TOOK ANOTHER JUMP

PIER LANDINGS LAST WEEK OVER SIX AND HALF MILLION.

Receipts of fresh fish at the Boston pier took another jump up last week over the corresponding period of 1935. For the week ending July 30, 150 arrivals brought in 6,592,100 pounds of fresh fish as compared with 114 arrivals and receipts of 5,765,100 pounds in the corresponding week of 1935.

Receipts were divided as follows: 1936—1,618,600 pounds of haddock; 686,500 pounds of scrod; 528,400 pounds of haddock; 686,500 pounds of scrod; 528,400 pounds of large cod; 1,014,200 pounds of market cod; 2,744,400 pounds of mixed fish.

1935—1,365,100 pounds of haddock; 765,000 pounds of scrod; 627,700 pounds of large cod; 1,279,000 pounds of market cod; 1,728,300 pounds of mixed fish.

From January 1 to date there have been 4054 arrivals with 185,421,816 pounds of fresh fish as compared with 3852 arrivals and receipts of 150,630,400 pounds of fresh fish brought in during the corresponding period of 1935.

Swordfish Receipts

Total receipts of swordfish from the fleet to date have been 3251 as compared with 4784 fish in the corresponding period of last year.
