

DRAGGER DENEHY HERE WITH REDFISH

AT SLADE-GORTON'S WITH 140,000 FOR FILLETING—GILL NETTERS HAD 41,300.

Three draggers, ten gill netters and a seiner had over 300,000 pounds of fresh fish in this port since yesterday when two draggers had 205,000 redfish; a dragger had 50,000 dressed whiting, and 1000 flounders at the Gorton-Pew Cold Storage; a seiner had 3500 mackerel at the Producers Fish company; and ten gill netters had 41,300 pollock. One dragger took out 140,000 redfish at Slade-Gorton's branch for filleting, while the other had 65,000 redfish at Cape Ann Cold Storage for filleting. Capt. Gerry Shoares had three netters with 17,000 pollock; Murray & Tarr, two, 9500; Gorton-Pew Fresh Fish department, three, 5800; Cape Ann Cold Storage, one, 5000; and Producers Fish company, one, 4000.

SMALL DAY AT BOSTON FISH PIER

TEN SEINERS AND THREE SMALL BOATS LANDED 136,000 POUNDS.

Only 14 craft touched at Boston fish pier since yesterday landing 136,000 pounds of mackerel and groundfish, with one of the list being a sword-fishing schooner with 86 fish, getting a new low for the season, 15 and 12 cents per pound. There were ten mackerel seiners with a total of 104,000 pounds, caught off the Maine coast, and containing a large number of blinks worth 11-2 cents a pound, while the larger mackerel obtained 31-2 to 4 cents. Three small boats had 32,000 pounds of mixed fish. Haddock and cod prices ran high due to the shortage.

FIVE SEINERS AT PRODUCERS TODAY

LANDED 16,500 LARGE MACKEREL—DRAGGER HAS LARGE REDFISH TRIP

Over 256,000 pounds of fresh fish was landed here over the week-end. Eleven gill netters in Saturday and Sunday lifts had 116,500 pounds of pollock; the dragger Leonora C., had 100,000 redfish and the dragger Restless, 16,000 dressed whiting for Gorton-Pew Cold Storage; five seiners had 16,500 large mackerel for Producers Fish company, while two traps had 1700 "tinker" mackerel; and one trap boat had 6000 whiting at the Cape Ann Cold Storage. The redfish were filleted.

HEAVY SUPPLY AT HUB TODAY

MOSTLY GROUND FISH BUT FIVE SWORDERS HAVE 467 FISH—FEW MACKEREL.

The Monday morning arrivals at the Boston fish pier numbered 41 today and receipts totalled 594,000 pounds of groundfish, 467 swordfish, 72,500 pounds of mackerel, and 531,000 pounds of mixed fish. Two of the swordfish, the Cape Ann and Mildred Silva, had 115 swordfish, record catches to date for a single boat. Mackerel trips were small.

The market opened up fairly strong on all varieties except swordfish which were down to 14 and 16 cents, lowest price this season.

SEINER HAD BIG MACKEREL TRIP

TOOK OUT 48,000 TO FILLET AT PEW WHARF—COASTER AT MATTLAGE'S

Three mackerel trips, a whiting fare, 10 gill netters, and a coaster, have contributed a total of 317,000 pounds of fresh and salt fish here since yesterday.

The coaster William Keene from Maine ports was at the Charles F. Matlage & Sons wharf with 175,000 pounds of salt cod and hake, and 42 barrels of cod oil. The seiner Santa Maria was at the Pew wharf of the Gorton-Pew Fisheries with 48,000 mackerel to fillet and salt, while the seiner Eleanor and a trap boat had 13,000 mackerel at the Cape Ann Cold Storage company. The dragger Annie and Mary was at Gorton-Pew Cold Storage wharf, with 27,000 dressed whiting.

The gill netters, 11 of them, had 54,500 pollock, which were taken as follows: Gorton-Pew fresh fish department, three boats, 17,000 pollock; Capt. Gerry Shoares, two, 10,500; Cape Ann Cold Storage, two, 10,000; Murray & Tarr, two, 8000; Portland Fish company, one, 5000; Producers Fish company, one, 4000.

POOR SEASON FOR THE SWORDERS

RECEIPTS TO DATE 3925 FISH AGAINST 6581 LAST YEAR.

Receipts of swordfish have been disappointing so far this season and totalled only about 33 1-3 per cent last week as compared with the corresponding week last year. Total receipts from the fleet to date have been 3925 fish as compared with 6581 in the same period of 1935. Foreign receipts have been considerably larger than a year ago.

BOSTON IS WELL SUPPLIED TODAY

TOTAL RECEIPTS OVER 1,500,000 POUNDS—SWORDER HAS 87 FISH.

Receipts were heavy again this morning at the Boston fish pier when a fleet of 35 reported with the usual summer assortment of fresh fish.

Total receipts were 735,000 pounds of groundfish, 195,000 pounds of redfish, 87 swordfish, 7000 pounds of butterfish, 136,500 pounds of fresh mackerel and 515,000 pounds of mixed fish. Sch. Mary E. D'Eon had the swordfish fare and the price fell to the lowest figure of the season, 16 and 12 cents per pound.

The Canadian boat O.K. Service is due today from Cape Breton with 215 swordfish.

LARGE SUPPLY AT HUB TODAY

FORTY-ONE ARRIVALS—ONE HALIBUTER, THREE SWORDERS AND 11 SEINERS.

A fleet of 41 vessels docked today at the Boston fish pier and brought in a large supply of fresh fish, including halibut, swordfish and mackerel. Total receipts were 740,000 pounds of groundfish, 20,000 pounds of halibut, 279 swordfish, 74,500 pounds of redfish, 380,000 pounds of fresh mackerel, 570,000 pounds of mixed fish, and 7000 pounds of salt cod. Prices were fairly good on most varieties of groundfish. Mackerel were lower and swordfish sold for 14 1-2 and 16 cents.

There were heavy swordfish receipts from Nova Scotia. The Yarmouth steamer brought in 136, St. John boat, 96; and O.K. Service from Cape Breton, 185.
