SUPPLY MODERATE AT BOSTON PIER

THREE SWORDERS AND A SEINER IN THE DAY'S ARRIVALS AT PIER.

A fleet of 25 furnished the supply for dealers at the Boston fish pier this morning. Total receipts were 410,000 pounds of groundfish, 148 swordfish, 340,000 pounds of groundfish, and 28,000 pounds of fresh mackerel.

PIER LANDINGS MILLION MORE

LAST WEEK'S RECEIPTS 5,557,300 POUNDS FROM 115 FARES.

Receipts of fresh fish at the Boston pier were nearly a million pounds of market cod; 1,389,900 pounds of mixed fish.

From January 1 to date there have been 4329 arrivals with 199,669,714 pounds of fresh fish as compared with 4178 arrivals and receipts of 186,032,000 pounds of fresh fish in the corresponding period of 1935.

Swordfish Receipts
Receipts of swordfish last week were about 33 1-3 per cent of the corresponding week last year. Total receipts to date have been 8044 fish as compared with 10,448 fish in the corresponding period last year.

Lobster Notes
Lobsters are high and have been selling for 45, 35, 30 and 20 cents per pound. The lobster season opened on August 15 in a part of Canada.

TEN MACKEREL FARES AT HUB

PRICE DROPS AGAIN—TOTAL RECEIPTS TODAY NEARLY 1,500,000 POUNDS

Ten seiners were among the 27 arrivals at the Boston fish pier this morning with 312,000 pounds of fresh mackerel and the price dropped to 2.35 cents per pound with blinks bringing 1 1-2 cents per pound. Other receipts were 562,000 pounds of groundfish, 100,000 pounds of redfish and 517,000 pounds of mixed fish. There were no sworders on hand. Groundfish prices were firm and high.

The St. John steamer brought 345 crates of live lobsters yesterday.

LOCAL SEINER HAS RECORD TRIP

SEBASTIANA C. LANDS 100,000 MACKEREL—DRAGGER HAD 80,000 REDFISH

A record fare of 100,000 pounds of fresh mackerel landed at Frank E. Davis' wharf this morning by the seiner Sebastiana C., Capt. Leo Fav-alora, raised the fresh fish receipts here since yesterday to 316,000 pounds. Of that amount three draggers had 58,000 dressed whiting; two draggers had 130,000 redfish; another seiner had 15,000 mackerel at Producers' Fish company; and four gill netters had 13,000 pollock.

The Slade-Gorton wharf of Gorton-Pew Fisheries had a dragger with 80,000 redfish, while the Gorton Pew Cold Storage had the other dragger with 50,000 redfish, and a dragger with 16,000 whiting. The Cape Ann Cold Storage had two draggers with 42,000 whiting.

HEAVY SUPPLY OF FRESH FISH—WITH ONE SWORDER ON HAND

Receipts were heavy this morning at the Boston fish pier. Thirty-four arrivals were on hand when the opening bell rang with 680,000 pounds of groundfish, 130,000 pounds of redfish, 56 swordfish, 19,000 pounds of fresh mackerel and 690,000 pounds of mixed fish. Sch. Irene and Mabel brought in the swordfish which sold at 25 cents per pound.

Groundfish prices held up fairly well and mackerel sold for 3.2 cents per pound.
