

ONLY ELEVEN IN THE BOSTON FLEET

RECEIPTS OF 750,000 POUNDS OF FRESH FISH—LITTLE CHANGE IN MARKET.

Only 11 vessels made up the fleet arriving at the Boston fish pier today and receipts fell below the million-pound mark. The total was 530,000 pounds of groundfish and 220,000 pounds of mixed fish. Four of the arrivals were beam trawlers, one was an offshore haddock, and the rest were from shore.

The market was the same as yesterday. The Yarmouth steamer brought a shipment of 443 crates of live lobsters yesterday.

FLEET OF 21 VESSELS AT THE FISH PIER THIS MORNING MARKET LOWER.

Twenty-one vessels landed their catches at the Boston fish pier this morning. Total receipts were 950,000 pounds of groundfish and 280,000 pounds of mixed fish with haddock dominating the supply.

The demand was lighter today and prices slackened, haddock selling at \$2; large cod, \$2 to \$2.50, and market cod, \$1.75 to \$2.

PEW WHARF HAS OVERLAND COD

TRUCKLOAD OF LARGE COD BROUGHT HERE—BOATS LANDED 10,300 POUNDS.

Some 34,000 pounds of fresh cod were landed here since yesterday, including an overland shipment of 24,000 pounds of large cod for splitting at the Pew wharf of Gorton-Pew Fisheries. Small boats had 10,300 pounds of cod, of which two small trawlers had 3000 pounds, and seven gill netters, 7300 pounds, distributed as follows: Cape Ann Storage, two trawlers and two netters, 5600 pounds; Tarr Fish company, two netters, 2000; Producers Fish company, two netters, 2000, and Progressive Fish company, a netter, 700 pounds.

NINE SMALL BOATS ARRIVED WITH COD

LANDED 17,300 POUNDS AT LOCAL WHARVES—DRAGGER HOME TO GO SEINING.

A fleet of nine small boats and an overland trip from Boston, accounted for 17,300 pounds of cod here since yesterday. The Pew wharf of the Gorton-Pew Fisheries took the overland fare of 7000 pounds of large cod for splitting; three small trawlers had 4500 cod, and six gill netters added 5800 pounds of cod. The Cape Ann Cold Storage had two of the trawlers and a gill netter with 4500 pounds; Producers Fish company had a trawler and two gill netters with 3000; Progressive Fish company, two gill netters, 1800; and Tarr Fish company, a gill netter, 1000 pounds.

The dragger St. Providenza arrived here last night from Norfolk, Va., to change over to mackerel seining. She plans to leave for the south by Monday. The local halibuter Raymonde, Capt. Carl C. Olsen, was scheduled to sail this forenoon on her fourth trip of the season.

LANDS 250,000 POUNDS GROUND-FISH AT GORTON-PEW'S—SMALL BOATS HAD 17,000.

A Boston beam trawler, five small trawlers and eight gill netters brought the week-end fresh fish totals here up to 267,000 pounds. A trawler landed 250,000 pounds of groundfish, half of which was cod, at the Gorton-Pew Cold Storage plant for filleting. The Cape Ann Cold Storage had two small trawlers with 4000 pounds of cod, while the Tarr Fish company had three small trawlers with 1500 pounds of cod.

WEATHER POOR BUT FISHING GOOD

RECEIPTS LAST WEEK EIGHT AND QUARTER MILLIONS AT PIER.

Boats engaged in the catching of groundfish have had much bad weather during the past week but report good fishing as a rule when weather permitted fishing. There were 131 arrivals at the Boston pier for the week ending April 8 and receipts were 8,273,100 pounds. In the same week of 1936, there were 106 arrivals and receipts of 7,487,400 pounds of fresh fish. The receipts for last week were the largest for any week since the third week in February.

A comparison of the receipts: 1937—3,708,000 pounds of haddock; 535,000 pounds of scrod; 804,000 pounds of large cod; 128,000 pounds of market cod; 1,946,100 pounds of mixed fish.

1936—3,398,000 pounds of haddock; 442,500 pounds of scrod; 1,480,000 pounds of large cod; 982,500 pounds of market cod; 1,184,400 pounds of mixed fish.

From January 1 to date there have been 1550 arrivals with 83,895,100 pounds of fresh fish. In the same period of 1936, there were 1706 arrivals and receipts of 80,523,514 pounds of fresh fish.

RUTH LUCILLE AT FORT STORAGE

DRAGGER HAS SMALL GROUND-FISH TRIP TODAY—TEN GILL NETTERS LIFT CATCHES.

Only 35,000 pounds of fresh fish was landed here since yesterday. A dragger had 25,000 pounds of haddock, hake and cod at the Cape Ann Cold Storage company, ten gill netters added 8400 cod, and a few small trawlers had 2000 pounds of cod, of which the Cape Ann Cold Storage had one trawler with 1600, and the Tarr Fish company, the rest with 500 pounds. The Producers Fish company had two gill netters with 2000 pounds; Gorton-Pew Fresh Fish department, two, 2000; Cape Ann Cold Storage, two, 2000; Progressive Fish company, three, 1400; Tarr Fish company, one, 1000.

Portland News.

The trawler Georgetown was due at Portland at 10 a. m. today with the next fare, the larger part of which will go to East Deering. She has about 40,000 pounds for the Portland Fish Company.
