

LAND REDFISH AT THE STORAGES

THREE DRAGGERS HAD 330,000 POUNDS FOR FILLETING — NETTERS LAND 15,000 COD.

The redfish fleet again landed on the fish heavily judging by today's arrivals here, when draggers had 330,000 pounds, of which the Cape Ann Cold Storage took two trips with 190,000 pounds, while the Gorton-Pew Cold Storage had one with 140,000 pounds, all for filleting. Today's arrivals brings the two-day total for redfish to 625,000 pounds.

The Pew branch of Gorton-Pew Fisheries had an overland shipment from Boston of 29,000 pounds of large cod, while the same place also had 4000 pounds of pollock in traps. The shore boats, eight small trawlers and 10 gill netters had 21,700 pounds of cod, when the Tarr Fish company took five trawlers and two gill netters, with 7000 pounds; Cape Ann Cold Storage, two trawlers and two netters, 2600; Producers Fish company, a trawler and a netter, 3000; Gorton-Pew Fish department, two netters, 3300; Capt. John Chianciola, a netter, 2000.

Portland Fish News.

The beam trawler Georgetown arrived at Portland, Monday morning from the banks with 300,000 pounds of groundfish for the Burnham & Morrill plant, the last of 18 trips for the East Deering factory, bringing the season's pack to 4,385,000 pounds.

A total of 83,500 pounds of groundfish was landed at Portland Monday by seven vessels of the Portland fleet; the Benjamin Thompson had 25,000 pounds; the Annie Louise and the Georgie C. Bowden, 18,000 pounds each; the Verna G., 10,000 pounds; the Pofisco, 5000 pounds; the Onward II., 4000 pounds; and the Elizabeth B., 3500 pounds.

TWENTY-FIVE IN TODAY'S FLEET

RECEIPTS ARE OVER 1,700,000 POUNDS—THREE BOATS HAVE MACKEREL.

All varieties of fresh fish except halibut were available to dealers on the Boston fish pier when the opening bell rang this morning. The arriving fleet numbered 25 when trading began.

Three were mackerel boats, two seiners and a netter, with 68,500 pounds. Other receipts were 1,112,000 pounds of groundfish, 120,000 pounds of redfish and 431,000 pounds of mixed fish. There was little change in the market.

Dealers at the Boston fish pier were well supplied this morning. There were 41 arrivals, including four with mackerel, and total receipts were 1,084,000 pounds of roundfish, 203,000 pounds of redfish, 108,000 pounds of fresh mackerel, 457,000 pounds of mixed fish.

OVERLAND FARE AT PEW WHARF

TRUCK LANDS 50,000 POUNDS LARGE COD—BOATS HAD TOTAL 24,500 POUNDS.

The waterfront returned to normal today insofar as fresh fish was concerned. Yesterday an overland shipment of 50,000 pounds of large cod was received at the Pew branch of Gorton-Pew Fisheries. This with a trap boat, three "jiggers" four small trawlers and 11 gill netters made up a total of 74,500 pounds, mostly cod.

The Pew branch had the trap boat with 2000 pounds small pollock; Tarr Fish company had the small trawlers with 4000 pounds cod; and Cape Ann Cold Storage company took the jiggers with 1000 pounds cod.

The gill netters were taken as follows: Progressive Fish company, two netters, 5100 pounds; Gorton-Pew Fresh Fish department, two, 4200; Tarr Fish company, two, 3000; Cape Ann Cold Storage, two, 2000; Capt. John Chianciola, one, 1500; Producers Fish company, one, 1200; Capt. Gerry Shoares, one, 500.

The halibut American brought down 12,000 pounds of salt cod, and 5000 pounds of fresh cod to Davis Brothers yesterday, while a Canadian lobster smack had 135 crates of lobsters for the Consolidated Lobster company of Bay View.

FIVE SEINERS HAVE MACKEREL AT NEW BEDFORD

The Portland sen. Sunapee, Capt. Ed Smith, will be the first of three Portland schooners to sail for the swordfishing grounds this season when he leaves port for southern Georges. About June 1 the Richard J. Nunan, Capt. Fred Bickford, and the Dirigo First, Capt. Charles Dexter, will follow the Sunapee to the banks in pursuit of the broadbills. Japanese competition and the very poor success of the fleet during the 1936 season have cut the 1937 fleet to three vessels.

CAUGHT MACKEREL HOUR FROM POINT

NETTERS HAD 2900 POUNDS — RECORD RECEIPTS 399,000 LBS. SINCE YESTERDAY.

Gloucester has had one of its best fish days of the season. Since yesterday, the fleet has landed 398,800 pounds.

Gorton-Pew Cold Storage took a beam trawler with 92,000 pounds of groundfish, a dragger with 42,000 redfish and a dragger with 5000 black backs; Slade-Gorton branch had a dragger with 70,000 redfish; Pew branch, an overland trip of 27,000 large cod and a dory trawler with 65,000 hake and cusk. The Cape Ann Cold Storage had a dragger with 50,000 redfish and 15,000 groundfish, two small netters with 2900 mackerel caught an hour's run southeast from Eastern Point, a trap boat and four "jiggers" with 7000 pollock, and two gill netters with 2000 pounds of cod.

The Tarr Fish company had six small trawlers with 4000 cod and a gill netter with 1500 cod; Progressive Fish company, a seiner with 12,000 mackerel and two netters with 5300 cod; Gorton-Pew fresh fish department, two netters with 7300 cod; Capt. Gerry Shoares, a netter with 2300 cod; Producers Fish company, a netter with 2000 cod; Capt. John Chianciola, a netter with 1500 cod.

The Consolidated Lobster company had two smacks, one from Cape Breton with 295 crates lobsters and the other from the Magdalen islands, her cargo not being reported.

THIRTY BOATS AT HUB TODAY

FOUR SMALL MACKEREL TRIPS ON HAND—LARGE SUPPLY OF REDFISH.

Nearly 1,500,000 pounds of fresh fish were brought to the Boston fish pier by 30 vessels this morning.

Three big redfish fares and four mackerel catchers were among the newcomers. Total receipts were 655,000 pounds of groundfish, 460,000 pounds of redfish, 79,000 pounds of fresh mackerel and 363,000 pounds of mixed fish.

There was little change in the market. Mackerel were lower and brought 2 1-2 cents per pound.
