

LOCAL MARKET WITHOUT SUPPLY

BREEZE CHECKED GILL NETTERS YESTERDAY—NO MACKEREL BOATS CONNECT.

Gloucester's waterfront drew a blank as far as fresh fish arrivals were concerned yesterday, the breeze blocking the gill net fleet from operating. All are out today, for the first time since Saturday. None of the mackerel fleet of netters or seiners reported.

The dragger Babe Sears with 90,000 pounds of redfish brought in here and reported yesterday, started to take out her catch this morning at the Gorton-Pew cold storage wharf.

"Save-The-Shad."

Shocked by the alarming decrease in the quantity of shad reaching the spawning grounds, commercial fishermen are demanding that a "save-the-shad" movement be given the right of way at the coming National Fisheries Convention to be held in Atlantic City early in February.

Frank T. Bell, United States commissioner of fisheries, has invited the fisheries commissions of states where shad is an important commercial variety to meet in conference at Atlantic City during the convention in order that they may exchange ideas and meet experienced shad fishermen from all these states with a view to developing a unified code of state regulations which will not only prevent further depletion of shad but serve to increase the quantities entering the streams annually for purposes of reproduction.

MACKEREL FLEET HAD GOOD WEEK

The mackerel fleet landed about 100,000 pounds last week. They were mostly from netters and were caught about 35 miles southeast of this port and northeast of Highland light. In the corresponding week last year the fleet landed 117,500 pounds, caught mostly off Cape Cod. Total catch of mackerel to date has been 36,488,200 pounds as compared with 46,222,900 pounds in 1935 and 34,656,310 pounds in 1934.

BOSTON PRICES HIGHER TODAY

RECEIPTS ARE SMALL AND UNDER 500,000 POUNDS—\$7.75 TOP FOR HADDOCK.

A fleet of 16 vessels was on hand this morning at the Boston fish pier with 214,000 pounds of groundfish and 185,000 pounds of mixed fish. The Jean Francis, British, brought 64,000 pounds of groundfish from Nova Scotia ports.

The market was strong and prices higher than yesterday, haddock leading the advance and selling for \$6 to \$7.75. Large cod sold for \$4 to \$5 and markets, \$3.50.

FISH SCARCE—WEATHER BAD

RECEIPTS AT PIER LAST WEEK, HOWEVER, WERE DOUBLE YEAR AGO.

Boats engaged in catching groundfish report fish scarce and bad weather. Prices have been good and vessels that have had fair catches have made good stocks. Steamer Maine on a recent week's trip stocked \$7100.

For the week ending December 17 there were 114 arrivals at the Boston fish pier with 6,722,300 pounds of fresh fish, almost double the receipts for the corresponding week of 1935. In the same week a year ago there were 90 arrivals with 3,752,700 pounds of fresh fish.

Receipts were divided as follows:
 1936—839,000 pounds of haddock; 466,800 pounds of scrod; 658,800 pounds of large cod; 1,522,200 pounds of market cod; 3,235,500 pounds of mixed fish.

1935—1,128,000 pounds of haddock; 679,000 pounds of scrod; 456,100 pounds of large cod; 323,500 pounds of market cod; 1,166,200 pounds of mixed fish.

From January 1 to date there have been 6547 arrivals with 304,946,114 pounds of fresh fish as compared with 6297 arrivals with 270,957,800 pounds of fresh fish in the corresponding period in 1935.

RECEIPTS ARE SMALLER AT HUB

EIGHTEEN ARRIVALS HAVE ONLY 280,000 POUNDS GROUND-FISH—PRICES LOWER.

A fleet of 18 vessels was on hand this morning at the Boston fish pier and will probably remain in port until after Christmas. They brought in 280,000 pounds of haddock and cod; 370,000 pounds of redfish and 280,000 pounds of mixed fish.

The market slumped from yesterday's high levels. Haddock sold at \$3.50 to \$4; large cod, \$2.50 and markets, \$3.
