

AMERICAN HAS HALIBUT FARE

AT HUB WITH 60,000—TOTAL RECEIPTS NEARLY 2,000,000 POUNDS TODAY.

Sch. American, Capt. Simon Theriault, was among the 42 arrivals at the Boston fish pier this morning and brought in a fare of 60,000 pounds of halibut, six swordfish and 2000 pounds of salt cod. The halibut sold for 17 1-2, 12 and 20 cents per pound. Other receipts were 1,005,000 pounds of groundfish, 49 swordfish, from two arrivals; 12,000 pounds of redfish, 900,000 pounds of mixed fish.

TRAWLER AT THE COLD STORAGE

NOTRE DAME HAS 132,000 LBS. GROUND FISH—NETTERS LIFTED 51,600 POLLOCK.

A beam trawler, a seiner, haddock-er, overland trip and 17 gill netters had 214,000 pounds of fresh fish here. The beam trawler landed 132,000 pounds of cod, haddock and mixed fish at the Gorton-Pew Cold Storage; a seiner had 400 pounds of mackerel at the Producers Fish company, a haddock had 12,000 cusk, and an overland trip of 18,000 cusk, at the Pew wharf of Gorton-Pew Fisheries. The gill netters, 17 in the fleet, had 51,600 pounds of pollock, landed as follows: Cape Ann Cold Storage four boats, 15,500 pounds; Capt. John Chianciola, three 10,500; Tarr Fish company, two, 9000; Progressive Fish company, five, 8800; Producers Fish company, two, 6000; and Gorton-Pew Fresh Fish department, one, 1800 pounds.

MACKEREL TRIPS MOSTLY "BLINKS"

LAST WEEK'S CATCH 126,500 POUNDS—LARGE FISH TAKEN OFF CHATHAM.

Last week the mackerel fleet landed 126,500 pounds of fresh mackerel, largely blinks with some one pound fish. Recent arrivals were a little larger run of fish and the mackerel were caught mostly off Chatham.

In the corresponding week last year the mackerel fleet landed 862,500 pounds of fresh mackerel. They were caught mostly off No Man's Land and South Shoal light and sold at 6.7 to 9 cents per pound for large and 7 cents for blinks.

Receipts of mackerel from the fleet to date have been 8,365,200 pounds as compared with 35,580,050 pounds in 1936; 39,389,100 pounds in 1935; 31,602,740 pounds in 1934; and 23,029,211 pounds in 1933.

Frozen Mackerel

Frozen mackerel have been in good demand. Some large and medium fish from Nova Scotia have sold at 10 cents per pound. Native fish are getting pretty well cleaned up.

HADDOCK LEADS AT BOSTON PIER

FLEET 20 CRAFT LAND 1,203,000 POUNDS TODAY—TRAWLER HAS MACKEREL.

Over 1,203,000 pounds of fresh fish was landed at Boston fish pier this morning at the opening bell, when 20 vessels reported with fares including nine beam trawlers, a schooner, and ten small boats. Although there were no seiners, one of the beam trawlers accounted for 2000 pounds of mackerel taken in her drag off Georges. Haddock predominated today when the tally showed 380,000 pounds of haddock landed; 231,000 pounds of cod; 155,000 pounds of redfish, and 535,000 pounds of mixed fish.

PIER LANDINGS BIGGER LAST WEEK

Total Landings Were 7,134,000 Pounds from 168 Arrivals.

Receipts at the Boston fish pier for the week ending September 23 were larger by a million and a half pounds than the corresponding week of 1936. Last week there were 163 arrivals with 7,134,000 pounds of fresh fish as compared with 130 arrivals and receipts of 5,517,700 pounds of fresh fish in the corresponding week of last year.

Receipts were divided as follows:
 1937—1,822,000 pounds of haddock; 1,447,000 pounds of scrod; 382,800 pounds of large cod; 716,500 pounds of market cod; 2,765,700 pounds of mixed fish.
 1936—1,085,400 pounds of haddock; 945,000 pounds of scrod; 320,800 pounds of large cod; 510,100 pounds of market cod; 2,656,614 pounds of mixed fish.

From January 1 to date there have been 4743 arrivals with 229,229,400 pounds of fresh fish. In the corresponding period of 1936, there were 4993 arrivals and receipts of 230,674,114 pounds of fresh fish.

Trend Toward "Fresh Fishing"

Boats comprising the famous "Lunenburg" fleet of Nova Scotia are gradually widening activities to include more angling for the fresh fish trade than in years gone by. No longer do the skippers and crews concentrate wholly on making catches for use in the dried fish trade. It is hardly necessary to point out that the shift in policy by the fishermen to include "fresh fishing" along with the centuries old "salt fishing" off the Grand Banks is profitable financially. The public demand for fresh fish in the market is more likely to grow than diminish with the normal increase in population. Although the basic conditions of fishing and agriculture are as different as land and water, the division of working time by fishermen to include the two types of catches is comparable to the rotation of crops by farmers. The market price for both crops of fish is helped thereby.

Incidentally the division of time into widely different methods of harvesting the finny denizens of the briny deep is a welcome diversion to the men of the crews. Despite the popular belief created by book and hearsay legend that the life of a "Grand Banks salt" is romantic and colorful albeit dangerous, the men themselves will vouch that in calm or storm it can become deadly monotonous.—Worcester Telegram.

Swordfish Notes

Two small trips of swordfish were landed last week at Boston. Total receipts to date have been 10,164 fish, 4918 from the fleet and 5246 from Nova Scotia. Last year at this time, 11,921 fish had been landed, 6256 from the fleet and 5665 from Nova Scotia.

DRAGGERS LAND TWENTY-NINE IN REDFISH SUPPLY BOSTON FLEET

TWO BOATS HAD 80,000 POUNDS RECEIPTS THIS MORNING OVER 1,700,000 POUNDS OF FRESH FISH

Two draggers, a haddock, and 18 gill netters accounted for 167,000 pounds of redfish in this port since yesterday when one dragger had 45,000 redfish at the Cape Ann Cold Storage wharf; a haddock had 16,000 haddock and cod at Tarr Fish company; and a dragger had 35,000 redfish and 18,000 mixed fish at the Slade-Gorton wharf of Gorton-Pew Fisheries. The gill netters had 53,000 pounds of pollock, landed as follows: Cape Ann Cold Storage, five boats, 13,500 pounds; Capt. John Chianciola, three, 12,000; Progressive Fish company, five, 10,000; Tarr Fish company, two, 8000; Producers Fish company, two, 5000; Gorton-Pew Fresh Fish department, one, 4500.
