

PERMIT TO ENGAGE IN FISHERY OPERATIONS WITHIN THE  
ALASKA PENINSULA FISHERIES RESERVATION.

Permit No. 86-1933.

Brown Fish Company,

Two Stations, as follows:

March 6, 1933.

Port Moller.

Ikatan.

A reservation designated as the Alaska Peninsula Fisheries Reservation having been created by the Executive Order of February 17, 1922, the Brown Fish Company, whose home office is at Anacortes, Washington, is hereby authorized to engage in the catching and salting of codfish for commercial purposes at two stations located as follows: Port Moller, in the Port Moller district; and Ikatan, within the Ikatan district, all within the said reservation, during the calendar year 1933, under the following conditions:

1. That operations are to be carried on at the salmon canneries of the Pacific American Fisheries, and the codfish to be salted at the Port Moller plant shall be the fish taken from the traps of that company. Cod-fishing for the Ikatan plant may be carried on between Sannak and Unimak Pass on the Sannak Banks.

2. That this permit does not grant any right to fish for or prepare salmon for market.

3. That the company shall observe the existing laws and regulations for the protection of the fisheries of Alaska and for the administration of the said reservation (copies of which are attached hereto and the conditions of which are made a part of this permit), as well as those that may hereafter be enacted or promulgated for such purposes..

4. That this permit expires December 31, 1933, is not transferable, and is revocable at any time at the pleasure of the Secretary of Commerce.
