

PERMIT TO ENGAGE IN FISHERY OPERATIONS WITHIN THE  
SOUTHWESTERN ALASKA FISHERIES RESERVATION

A reservation designated as the Southwestern Alaska Fisheries Reservation having been created by the Executive Order of November 3, 1922, Roland Carl, whose home office is at Seattle, Washington, is authorized as successor to Charles B. Meyers to operate a floating plant for the taking and canning of salmon and clams for commercial purposes at Paulie Creek, within the Cook Inlet District of the said reservation, during the calendar year 1924 under the following conditions:

1. That the permittee may operate one salmon trap at the north end of Kalgin Island, as located by C. B. Meyers in the season of 1922, and also may operate five hundred (500) fathoms of gill nets for the capture of salmon. Fish may also be purchased from gill-net fishermen who hold the necessary permits.

2. That the pack of red salmon shall not exceed one thousand five hundred (1,500) cases and the total pack of salmon shall not exceed three thousand (3,000) cases, computed upon the basis of 48 one-pound cans per case.

3. That the permittee may operate on clam beaches from Harriet Point to Tuxedni Harbor, and may pack not to exceed two thousand five hundred (2,500) cases, computed upon the basis of 48 one-pound cans per case or their equivalents in "eastern oyster" or "1/2 pound flats" on the basis of total contents of can.

4. That the permittee shall observe the existing laws and regulations for the protection of the fisheries of Alaska and for the administration of the said reservation (copies of which are attached hereto and the conditions of which are made a part of this permit), as well as those that may hereafter be enacted or promulgated for such purpose.

5. That this permit expires December 31, 1924, is not transferable, and is revocable at any time at the pleasure of the Secretary of Commerce.
