

Stream No. 18 (1 notice) On east side entrance Cochran Bay.
Is 7 feet wide and 4 inches deep.
Has a fine gravel bottom.
Is accessible about 1,500 feet. Splits up at about 1,200 feet.
Has a shallow salt water mouth.
Aug. 15, 1924: 8,000 fish here.
July 21, 1925: Visited this stream and others in Cochran Bay.
There were scarcely any fish in or around any of them, and
what there were were badly discolored and only around the
mouth. Fish should be here at that time.
July 27, 1926: 2,000 fish.
Aug. 3, 1927: 7,000 fish.

Stream No. 19 (2 notices) Head Cochran Bay, east side.
Is 5 feet wide and 6 inches deep.
Has a medium coarse gravel bottom.
Is accessible for fish about 1 mile. Fish up over 2,000 feet.
There is a small lake here covering an area of about 30 acres. A
few humps in it at its outlet. No fish around its shores. No
stream enters it.
July, 1926: 6,000 fish all told. (Another stream 400 fish also)
Another stream on west side. (Same markers)
6 feet wide and 5 inches deep.
Coarse gravel and boulder bottom, swift water.
Accessible 800 feet. Bay shallow at head.
July 26, 1926: 6,400 fish (both streams)
Aug. 13, 1927: 5,000 fish.

Stream No. 20 (1 notice) West side Cochran Bay.
Is 10 feet wide and 6 inches deep above forks.
Has a medium coarse gravel and sand bottom at mouth,--rougher
further up. Accessible 1500 feet. Fish up it 600 feet. Bay
shallow at head. Good bottom there.
July 26, 1926: 4,000 fish all told (2,000 fish in stream: 2,000
around mouth)
August 13, 1927: 2,500 fish.

Stream No. 21 (2 notices) West side Cochran Bay.
There are 5 small clear-water streams here and 2 big glacier streams.
The south side one is 40 feet wide and 8 inches deep; north side one
is slightly larger.
The 5 clear-water streams run about 11 feet wide and 5 inches deep, and
have most of the fish, although the short glacier stream on the
south has quite a few.
July 26, 1926: 7,000 fish; Aug. 13, 1927: 5,000 fish.
