

Stream No. 6 (2 notices) East shore Gravina Bay.

Is 25 feet wide and 6 inches deep.

The bottom near mouth is grey rock and slate gravel.

In the stream proper there are a lot of rough rocks. I

did not go up it, but I would see it was short,--

not more than 1/4 mile for fish.

Sept. 16, 1927 visit,--500 fish.

Stream No. 7 (2 notices) Head beartrap Bay.

Is 30 feet wide and 18 inches deep. (Smaller Sept. 17, 1927)

Has a good fine gravel bottom, some granite,--accessible for

about 1/2 mile, may be more.

Some glacier water in it, but fairly clear.

Should be all right for humps.

There are 2 other streams here, but they just drop off the

mountainside onto a pile of bare rocks.

Sept. 17, 1927,--5,000 fish.

Stream No. 8 (2 notices) Beartrap Bay near entrance.

Is 12 feet wide and 12 inches deep.

Has a fine gravel bottom and good bar at mouth.

Accessible about 600 feet above mean high tide,--high

fall them.

Sept. 17, 1927,--500 fish.

Stream No. 9 Head Gravina Bay.

Main stream is glacier water and large and in several parts.

There are some silvers go in here.

Sept. 17, 1927 visit. No signs of humps, but one dead.

Dog salmon and a few silver heads.

Stream No. 10 (2 notices) Head of Olson Bay.

Is 20 feet wide and 12 inches deep.

Has a good fine gravel bottom.

Main stream is accessible $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles,--the branch to

the northwest 1/2 mile long.

The mouth goes dry at low tide for quite a distance out.

Sept. 17, 1927 visit,--47,450 fish.
