

Stream No. 19 (2 notices) Cut-off

Is 50 feet wide and 6 inches deep near grass banks.

It has an exceptionally good fine gravel bottom,--greenstone
greyrock and slate same as others here.

Should be accessible for a mile,--maybe more.

There is another very small one ~~here~~ also.

Went up this one 1/2 mile. Fish scarce. Only 2,830--Sept. 12 '27.

Stream No. 20 (2 notices) Cut-off

Is 25 feet wide and 10 inches deep where the current is not
too fast.

And another one 12 feet wide and 6 inches deep.

The bottom is good in both streams.

The gravel is coarser than others in the cut-off, but there
is considerable fine mixed with it. The greenstone
mixture is missing here.

Accessible about 1 mile, splits at 3,500 feet.

Sept. 12, 1927,---6,560 fish.

Stream No. 21 (1 notice) Cut-off

Is 6 feet wide and 4 inches deep and comes into a lagoon
accessible 3,300 feet.

Good fine bottom.

Visit Sept. 12, 1927,-----2,230 fish.

Stream No. 22 (2 notices)

This stream is split near mouth, making two combined.

They measure 12 feet wide and 6 inches deep.

Has a good fine gravel bottom at mouth. Coarser upstream,
but all good.

Accessible 1 mile then splits up. Fish could go about 1/2
mile further.

Sept. 12, 1927 visit 6,600 fish.

Stream No. 23 (1 notice)

Is 10 feet wide and 6 inches deep,--medium fine gravel bottom.

Flat country,--flat back from mouth.

Is accessible about 2,200 feet.

Sept. 12, 1927 visit 2,500 fish.
