

Stream No. 31 In Lagoon, Jackpot Bay.

Is 12 feet wide and 4 inches deep.

Has a rough, rocky bed.

Accessible about 400 feet above high tide.

There is a good coarse gravel bar exposed for a distance of 250 feet at half tide. About 100 fish in stream, but about 2,000 fish in bay around mouth, visit Aug. 4, 1926. Visit Aug. 26, 1927: 6,360 fish.

Stream No. 32 North wide Jackpot Bay. Red Lakes.

Fish commence to run here about July 1st. There are 6 lakes here connected with shallow streams, in one chain, running about 4 miles north, swinging a little eastward about the center of them, and 2 small ones off the wide.

On Sept. 17, 1925, saw 100 live reds and some dead. (No amount given.) at the head of the 3d lake. On Sept. 17, 1926, 101 alive and 140 dead same place.

On Sept. 17, 1926, total amount in all lakes: 493 reds alive and dead, and one king dead in 6th lake. About 10,000 humps in 1926.

No estimate on reds 1927 or humps either. Allowed 20,000 humps.

Stream No. 33 N.W. arm Jackpot Bay.

4 feet wide and 4 inches deep. Streams very low at present. Only accessible about 200 feet above high tide, but has a fine gravel bar at mouth, with shallow salt water. At least 1,000 fish have spawned here and there are 4,000 more around this stream, making a total of 5,000 fish August 4, 1926. Some in large N. stream also. August 26, 1927. visit: 6,300 fish.

Stream No. 34 S.W. arm Jackpot Bay near head.

Is 20 feet wide and 10 inches deep.

The bottom at mouth is fine gravel and upstream boulders and a mixture of fine gravel.

In many places, it has a width of from 50 to 60 feet, corresponding depth.
