

Stream No. 5 (2 notices) Head east arm Wells Bay, south side.
Is 12 feet wide and 7 inches deep.
Has a good coarse gravel bed, accessible 400 feet above mean high tide.
At low tide goes dry 800 feet out from high tide line. Gravel bar around mouth fine.
There is nothing to indicate that more than 300 fish spawned here visit Sept. 9, 1926.
No visit 1927. Allowed for.

Stream No. 6 (2 notices) North side head east arm Wells Bay.
Is 60 feet wide and 8 inches deep and is part glacier water.
Has a fine gravel stream bed.
The fish are up it about 3,000 feet above high tide line, but most of them are in the first 2,000 feet.
There is another small stream comes under same markers. It is only accessible about 100 feet. 300 fish all told there.
Large one 9,000 fish alive and dead. Total 9,300 fish, visit Sept. 9, 1926.
No visit 1927. Allowed for.

Stream No. 7 (2 notices) Unakwik Inlet. At camery.
Is about 100 feet wide and from 3 to 4 inches deep.
The water was low on this visit.
Is accessible about 1,000 feet from mean high tide line and has a long shoal from there out.
Has a high falls 22 feet high and a large lake above that.
Stream bed is coarse gravel and sand.
Visit Sept. 13, 1925, I gave this place 20,000 fish.
Visit Sept. 10, 1926----16,000 fish. All estimates allow for dead.

Stream No. 8 (Notices at reef) Cowpen, Unakwik Inlet, east side.
No measure. Red stream with lake.
On October 7, 1925, I found 200 silvers in a small lake connected with the large one, but no reds, and only about 75 dead humps here.
