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

A wave in the normal easterly wind pattern over the Caribbean Sea developed into a tropical storm on October 5, 1958 as the wave moved westward across the Greater Antilles Islands and reached a position about 400 miles south of Miami. The first advisory on Tropical Storm "Janice" was issued at 11 A.M. EST Sunday, October 5, 1958 by the Miami Weather Bureau Office after earlier bulletins had been issued by the San Juan Weather Bureau Office as the easterly wave caused destructively heavy rains in some of the Greater Antilles. The storm moved northeastward across Cuba at about 15 miles per hour as indicated on the cover of this report and developed to hurricane intensity late Monday, October 6. Gale warnings were issued at 11 P.M. October 6 for the coastal area from Cape Hatteras to Vero Beach, Florida. It continued northeast across the Bahamas then on into the North Atlantic well south of Newfoundland. On Tuesday and Wednesday, October 7-8, the storm slowed down considerably to about 7 miles per hour but on Thursday and Friday it accelerated and began moving to the northeast at 15-25 miles per hour. At no time did it pose a direct threat to the U. S. mainland.

The reconnaissance of the storm by Navy, Air Force and National Hurricane Research Project aircraft provided the forecast centers with timely information on the location, intensity and other features of the storm. In addition, many helpful reports were received from land-based radar at the University of Miami and missile tracking stations.

The lowest pressure in Hurricane "Janice" was measured by an Air Force reconnaissance aircraft as 968 millibars (28.59 inches) at 2:35 A.M. EST October 10, 1958 after an almost "explosive" deepening of about 18 millibars within a few hours. The highest surface wind reported was 125 miles per hour by hurricane reconnaissance aircraft on October 10, 1958.

According to preliminary and incomplete reports 12 lives were lost in the Bahama Islands and the Greater Antilles. Over 20 inches of rain fell on Jamaica causing much crop devastation, many homes destroyed and severed communications. No damage was reported from the coastal areas of the United States.

TROPICAL DEPRESSION JANICE HAS DEVELOPED IN A STRONG EASTERLY WAVE SOUTH OF CUBA DURING THE PAST SEVERAL HOURS. AT 11 AM EST...1600Z...JANICE WAS LOCATED AT LATITUDE 20.7 NORTH LONGITUDE 81.7 WEST OR 175 STATUTE MILES SOUTH SOUTHEAST OF HAVANA CUBA.

THE DEPRESSION HAS BEEN DRIFTING SLOWLY NORTH NORTHWESTWARD BUT AT THE PRESENT TIME IT APPEARS TO BE NEARLY STATIONARY. WINDS OF 25/35 MPH EXTEND 60 MILES TO THE NORTH AND EAST OF THE CENTER WITH VELOCITIES UP TO 40 MPH IN HEAVIER SQUALLS. ONLY LIGHT WINDS HAVE BEEN REPORTED SOUTHWEST OF THE CENTER.

THE AFTERNOON REPORTS FROM THE VICINITY OF TROPICAL DEPRESSION JANICE HAVE NOT BEEN RECEIVED YET HOWEVER IT IS ESTIMATED THAT THE DEPRESSION IS REMAINING ABOUT STATIONARY OR DRIFTING SLOWLY IN A NORTHERLY DIRECTION. THE CENTER IS 150 TO 175 MILES SOUTH SOUTHEAST OF HAVANA CUBA:

WINDS OF 25/35 MPH EXTEND 60 MILES OR SO TO THE NORTH AND EAST WITH VELOCITIES UP TO 40 MPH IN HEAVIER SHOWERS AND SQUALLS. ONLY LIGHT WINDS ARE REPORTED FROM THE SOUTHWEST QUADRANT.

AT 5 PM EST...2200Z...THE CENTER WAS LOCATED AT LATITUDE 21.4 NORTH LONGITUDE 81.3 WEST OR ABOUT 140 STATUTE MILES SOUTHEAST OF HAVANA CUBA. THE STORM APPEARED TO BE MOVING NORTHWARD ABOUT 7 MPH.

HIGHEST WINDS ARE NOW 40 TO 45 MPH IN SQUALLS EXTENDING 60 MILES TO THE NORTH AND EAST OF THE CENTER. WINDS ARE SOMEWHAT LESS IN THE SOUTHWEST QUADRANT.

THE STORM IS EXPECTED TO CONTINUE TO MOVE TOWARDS THE NORTH AT ABOUT 9 MPH DURING THE NEXT 12 HOURS. LITTLE CHANGE IN INTENSITY IS EXPECTED DURING THE NIGHT AS THE CENTER CROSSES CUBA BUT SOME INTENSIFICATION IS EXPECTED THEREAFTER AS IT MOVES INTO THE FLORIDA STRAITS ON MONDAY.

SMALL CRAFT ALONG THE SOUTHEAST FLORIDA COAST AND KEYS SOUTH OF VERO BEACH AND IN THE WESTERN BAHAMAS SHOULD REMAIN IN PORT AS SQUALLS WILL SPREAD INTO THIS AREA TONIGHT OR MONDAY.

ALL INTERESTS IN THE CENTRAL PORTION OF CUBA SHOULD TAKE PRECAUTIONS FOR HEAVY RAINS AND STRONG WINDS.

AT 2 AM EST TROPICAL STORM JANICE IS CROSSING CENTRAL CUBA. THE CENTER PASSED INLAND ON THE SOUTH CUBAN COAST EARLY TONIGHT AND WILL ENTER THE ATLANTIC LATER TONIGHT A SHORT DISTANCE NORTHWEST OF CAIBARIEN CUBA. THE CENTER IS SOME 30 TO 40 MILES NORTHEAST OF CIENFUEGOS CUBA MOVING IN A DIRECTION BETWEEN NORTHNORTHEAST AND NORTHEAST AT ABOUT 10 MPH.

THE STORM WILL BECOME DISORGANIZED CROSSING CUBA HOWEVER IT WILL REGAIN ITS ORGANIZATION OVER THE OPEN WATER BETWEEN CUBA AND THE BAHAMAS. HIGHEST WINDS ARE ABOUT 50 MPH IN SQUALLS TO THE NORTH AND EAST OF THE CENTER WITH WINDS OF 30/40 MPH EXTENDING 150 MILES TO THE NORTH AND EAST AND NOT QUITE SO FAR TO THE SOUTHWEST. THE STORM SHOULD CONTINUE ON THE SAME COURSE AT ABOUT 10 MPH DURING THE NEXT 12 HOURS AND INTENSIFY AFTER EMERGING OVER THE OPEN WATER TO THE NORTH OF CUBA.

THIS COURSE WOULD KEEP THE CENTER WELL TO THE EAST OF THE SOUTHEAST FLORIDA COAST.

RECONNAISSANCE AIRCRAFT REPORTS FROM TROPICAL STORM JANICE THIS MORNING INDICATE THAT SHE HAS BEEN MOVING SLIGHTLY FASTER THAN INDICATED IN OUR LAST ADVISORY. AT 8 AM EST THE STORM WAS CENTERED ABOUT 200 STATUTE MILES SOUTHEAST OF MIAMI AND A SHORT DISTANCE OFF THE SOUTH END OF ANDROS ISLAND BAHAMAS MOVING TOWARD THE NORTHEAST AT ABOUT 15 MPH.

THE CENTER SHOULD CROSS ANDROS THIS MORNING PASS SLIGHTLY SOUTH OF NASSAU THIS AFTERNOON AND REACH ELEUTHERA BAHAMAS THIS AFTERNOON. THIS COURSE WILL KEEP THE CENTER 175 TO 200 MILES OFF THE LOWER EAST COAST OF FLORIDA.

AT 5 PM EST...2200Z...WAS ESTIMATED BY SHIP REPORTS TO BE NEAR LATITUDE 43.0 NORTH LONGITUDE 47.0 WEST OR ABOUT 390 STATUTE MILES SOUTHEAST OF CAPE RACE NEW FOUNDLAND. THE STORM IS MOVING TOWARDS THE EAST-NORTHEAST AT ABOUT 44 MPH.

HIGHEST WINDS ESTIMATED FROM SHIP REPORTS ARE ABOUT 75 MPH OVER A SMALL AREA SOUTHEAST OF THE CENTER. GALE WINDS EXTEND OUTWARD 300 MILES SOUTHEAST SEMICIRCLE AND 125 MILES NORTHEAST SEMICIRCLE. JANICE IS RAPIDLY LOSING HURRICANE CHARACTERISTICS AND BECOMING A NORTH ATLANTIC STORM.
