Meteors.—The night of the 30th, they were seen at Golden City, Col., Tioga, Penn., and Lyndon, Ill., as well as on a few other dates at single stations.


Earthquakes.—At 4 A. M., of the 24th, two shocks were felt at Carson City, Nevada. The direction was from the northeast. The first shock was light, the second quite severe and lasted several seconds. The same was felt at Sacramento, Cal., but without damage to property.

Migration of birds.—On the 6th, at Warrensburg, Mo., geese flying south; on the 27th and 28th, at Indianola, Texas, geese flying north; on the 29th, at Nashville, Tenn., cranes flying north, and at Newport, Fla., geese and cranes flying north.

Off Clifton, Staten Island, N. Y., seals were seen on the ice during the 28th.

At Marquette, Mich., out of ninety-three observations made on the rise and fall of the surface of the water in the lake, it acted with the barometer twenty-five times, and contrary to it sixty-eight times.
