CLOUD PICTURES

Undoubtedly the finest collection of cloud pictures ever assembled is that published in the "International Atlas of Clouds and of States of the Sky," recently issued in Paris under the auspices of the International Meteorological Organization. An abridged edition of this work appeared in 1930. The complete edition now available contains 174 plates, most of them colored. Separate versions have been issued with text in English, French and German. Apart from its obvious scientific value, this atlas should prove a boon to landscape artists, a large proportion of whom, it seems, stand in urgent need of information about the typical aspects of the cloudy sky!

Since this work was not published for profit there can be no indiscretion in the announcement that, while the regular price is about \$22, the American Meteorological Society has obtained through a special arrangement a number of copies ~~that~~ it offers for sale at \$8 each.
