Winter vacationing in the West Indies! "A tropical paradise" is what these islands have been called, and they are also an excellent health resort. The West Indies are bathed by the north equatorial current of the Atlantic, whose temperature exceeds 80 degrees the year round. Thus they have a generally uniform climate, warm and humid, but the sunshine is not oppressive. The winds are mostly from the north-east. Therefore the western portions of the islands, or the lee sides, are the driest. The coolest islands are those nearest the North American coast. The temperature in winter seldom falls below 60 degrees. There are no hurricanes from January to April.
