Automobiles and lightning! There has been more or less curiosity as to whether automobiles on the road are in any special danger from lightning. As a matter of fact there is no place on earth which affords absolute safety. Against the great voltages of lightning the rubber tires of automobiles do not render immunity. When on high ground cars are more of a target for lightning than on low ground. So in a thunderstorm, to secure reasonable safety, drive into a garage or a shed, and if that is not possible, park at a low place in the road away from trees, poles and fences.
