Where lightning may strike! Our fears are not at all dispelled when we read that reliable statistics say there are fewer fatalities from lightning than from any other cause. In fact we all feel more or less apprehensive when those gigantic sparks begin to crack. The question is often asked: does lightning hit the same place twice? A great many objects are not well exposed and so are seldom struck; but others such as steeples, the Washington Monument, and the Eiffel Tower offer good targets and are struck many times. Some of our skyscrapers have been struck often, but their steel framework offered so many paths for the electricity that those in a building were not aware that the building was hit.
