August gardens! The gardener may have the hottest days of the summer this month. In the North very early beets, kohlrabi, and radishes may be sown. Onions should be pulled as soon as the tops begin to ripen, and then aired by allowing them to lie on the ground for two or three days; further drying may be continued in a well ventilated room. Tomatoes may be slow ripening; if so, put in straw in a cold frame with glass in place. Continue the dusting of potatoes and other vegetables. Farther south, peas planted this month will yield a good fall crop. Lettuce, Brussels sprouts, early turnips, sweet corn, string beans and winter radish may be sown. Later in the month set out cabbage plants.
