Canada's winter climate! Few realize that the southern boundary of Canada is no farther south than is Rome, Italy, and that even within the Arctic Circle there are lands having agricultural possibilities. As a whole, Canada certainly does not deserve the name of "Our Lady of the Snows." In fact, the western coast has as mild a climate as the British Isles, the cold spells being never severe; and the eastern Maritime Provinces are only slightly colder than western Europe of the same latitudes. The interior of Canada is the coldest portion, but even there the climate is tempered by large bodies of water. In Alberta, where the chinook blows, there are large areas usually bare of snow all winter.
