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Rain in St. Lawrence Valley! Surveying the rainfall of the entire globe, one finds interesting rain types. The chief feature of the rainfall in the St. Lawrence Valley is its uniformity throughout the year. It is the same as that of New England and New York and this characteristic may be noted as far south as Washington, D.C. It is believed that the humidity and warmth of the Great Lakes, the St. Lawrence Valley and the Gulf Stream have much to do toward making the storm (cyclone) tracks converge on both the St. Lawrence Valley and New England. This condition explains the vigorous winter storms making the precipitation in that season as much as in summer. Inland, however, the continental effects cause many afternoon thunderstorms resulting in a summer maximum.
