Photography and weather! A quarter of a century ago it was not generally thought possible to make a photograph of a scene which would show more details than were visible to the eye. Indeed, in ordinary photography haziness shows more dense than appears to the eye. Now, however, with panchromatic plates and a red filter, distant objects are much clearer than they are to the eye. Another interesting application of infra-red photography is photographing a scene in daytime with moonlight effects. In this case the deep shadows so characteristic of moonlight are perfectly reproduced. This application is especially valuable to the movie picture profession.
