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Ocean weather! Voyaging on the Atlantic in September has somewhat more spice than in the summer months. While cyclonic gales will have increased in frequency along the ship lanes to Europe, the chances are greater for fair weather than for foul. In the southern latitudes the hurricane season has reached its peak, but even at that the average for September is only three such storms, and in some years there are none in September. These storms may occur anywhere over the entire West Indian region. Many of them proceed to northern waters, invading the steamship routes. Fog will be less frequent from New England to Newfoundland, but there will be an increase north of the Azores.
