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Frosts and spring planting! When planting should be done is always a question, due to the possibility of late frosts. There is, of course, an average date of last killing frost, but individual springs differ so much from one another that in some years and in some localities the last killing frost may occur as much as one month after the average date. Some of the hardier crops such as potatoes, radishes and onions, may be planted as much as two weeks before the average date of last killing frost, but others should be planted later. Some gardeners, being acute observers of nature, watch carefully the progress of native trees and wild plants and sow accordingly.
