Spring weather! Mark Twain in one of his speeches said: "In the spring I have counted one hundred and thirty-six different kinds of weather inside twenty-four hours." These remarks were made in connection with New England weather. New England and southeastern Canada lie right in the path of many storms as they pass from west to east. There the seasons are in sharp contrast with one another. Spring has a variable character in New England and southeastern Canada, due to the storms which often keep on coming until late spring, and to the growing influence of the sun, which is mounting each day higher and higher in the sky, giving many days of almost summer warmth.
