Latitude and twilight! Many people in visiting Norway about June 22 used to make trips to the northern part of that country to witness the midnight sun. This was a pleasant thing to do because the northern Atlantic Ocean is warmer for its latitude than any other place in the world. In North America, journeys for such a purpose are not popular, in part because of the colder climate. However, twilight lasting all night may be experienced at 60 degrees north latitude, or about at Juneau, Alaska, from April 23 to August 22. The shortest twilight is at the equator about March 22 and September 22, when it lasts only slightly over an hour.
