Winter in Death Valley! The Indians called this region "Tomesha", meaning "ground afire." It is all that, to summer visitors who find it an exertion to raise water to their lips and can hardly believe that provision should be taken against winter's cold. Freezing weather in Death Valley may begin the last of October, but usually it is delayed until November. This region, North America's hottest spot in summer, has a record of 134 degrees for highest and 15 for lowest, making a range of 119 degrees. This range, however, is not nearly so great as that of the coldest place in the world, Verkhoyansk, Siberia, whose range is 196 degrees - from 94 below to 102 above.
